

LETTER HAS BEEN SENT

Ottawa, July 26th, 1894.

Sir,

Referring to conversation upon the occasion of your recent visit to the Department, I beg to inform you that it has been decided to send a Surveyor from here to do the work which requires attention within your Agency.

As he will be ready to start from here any time after a week from date, I will be glad to hear from you when you will be returning, since, from what I remember of what you said, much the most convenient and inexpensive way for him to reach the scene of operations would be for him to accompany you on your boat.

If you are likely to be longer in starting, then it would be advisable to keep our Surveyor waiting. Will you kindly state what work he could commence upon to best advantage, pending your return? and also the best way for him to reach it?
