Have felt rather badly ever since Tuesday last at not having been able to have more talk with you and your good wife. Oh yes, I do not forget that my daughters—in-law and daughter were indispensable. Needless to add, Miss Edmondson was pretty much a hostess in herself as well.

Have no trouble whatever answering the questions you ask about the Columbia Ph.D. thesis. Why you should have the burden of restoring to commonsense these inane attempts at writing, I never will know.

With everything you say I agree without the least modification. What the author says about the varying meanings of the term "Minister without portfolio" is just in an enonsense. The Committee of the Privy Council is the Cabinet. There is no difference whatever in the two designations.
