sioned the revision and updating of the original bibliographies.

The first bibliography contained in the new edition was revised by the Institute of Canadian Studies, Carleton University, under the supervision of Dr. Sidney Wise, the Institute's Director. The bibliography, entitled <u>Introduction to Canadian Studies</u>, contains a total of twelve annotated sections including two new ones: "General Reference Works" and "Interdisciplinary Journals". Other sections have been expanded and updated to contain relevant works published since the first printing of the bibliography. The format has been streamlined to correspond with the bibliography prepared in French under the direction of Mr. Jacques Grimard, the archivist of the "Centre de recherches en civilisation canadienne-française" at the University of Ottawa. Under the title <u>Le Canada par le livre</u>, the bibliography has been expanded and now contains new sections on interdisciplinary journals, the native people and foreign policy, for a total of eleven listings.

The third bibliography included here, a survey of Microform Resources in Canadian Studies Disciplines, was revised by its original author Dr. John Moldenhauer of Guelph University, and now includes many new titles microformed since the first edition of this publication. The survey provides an annotated listing of selected microforms available in Canada and is now divided into subject headings by disciplines corresponding to the extent possible to the format of other bibliographies contained in this collection.

The final bibliography prepared in English by Josef Jurkovic of the Academic Relations Division, Department of External Affairs, contains an annotated listing of major collections and series of books
