RAGER FOR TROUBLE.

The local Opposition organ seems nations to cause as much trouble a possible to its own political friends who hold local offices in the civil pervice. Office-seeking and office-holding evidently are the Rossite organ's chief conceptions of the duties and responsibilities of governmental power.

UNFAITHFUL NEWSPAPERS.

The Ross Government had not one daily newspaper supporter of the courage to denounce the things that brought about the Waterloo of Wednesday. This is not a pleasant thing to have to say of a large section of the newspaper press. Thousands and thousands of Liberal voters defected but not one newspaper. So much the worse for the papers.

The Globe was a corporation paper all the time; never once did it warn Mr. Ross that he was raiding the public and the municipalities of their rights. It never named and asked for the retirement of any wrongdoer engaged in election frauds. And those who owned The Globe owned another -an evening paper engaged in the same business. These two papers exploited the Liberal party for their corporation owners, and the Liberal party is to-day in the dust!

Papers of the class of The Hamilton Times, The Brantford Expositor, The Kingston Whig, the two latter edited by men with seats in the Legislature, forget what the word liberal meant. They never protested against any corporation raid or advised Mr. Ross that he was violating all the traditions of his party. They were content to see the attorneygeneral of the province the biggest corporation promoter in the country

So-called independent papers like The Herald of Hamilton stuck by Hon. J. M. Gibson through thick and thin. Within two days of the election this paper asked that Ross be given a decisive majority so that he might rid himself of the crooks that surrounded him. Surely an independent paper would have suggested his retirement because of this thing.


The country weekly Liberal press were weak and without influence. They justified nearly everything that was done. They stood for everything that the corporation papers proposed. They never protested,— Toronto World.

ONTARIO'S POLITICAL HISTORY.

The political history of Ontario has been one long series of almost unbroken success for the Liberals at the polls. When the province was established under confederation the Premiership was given by Sir John Macdonald to John Sandfield Macdonald, one of the old Liberals, who formed a coalition government, which was afterwards opposed by the Liberal party. Mr. Arch. McKellar led the Liberal Opposition until 1869, when Hon, Edward Blake succeeded him. By his skill in leadership the Sandfield Macdonald Government was overthrown, and Mr. Blake became Premier in December, 1871. The abolition of the dual representation in 1872 led to Mr. Blake's withdrawal to Ottawa.

Hon. Oliver Mowat then descended from the Bench and embarked on the Premiership, Oct. 21, 1872, a position which he was to hold with such dignity and success for alm a quarter century. Three years followed before Mr. Wowat appealed to the people, but his triumph at six essive general elections is a fact which can never be gainsaid as evidence of his great hold on the peo-

ple of the province. Curiously enough, his first campaign was characterized by charges scandal in connection with the Central Prison and the colonization roads, but these cries, like all their ors, were found to be basel In the election of 1879 he carried Ontario by a good majority, although Sir John Macdonald had only a short time before secured a Conservative majority from the same territory



in his National Policy sweep. Sir Matthew Crooks Cameron, who had been Conservative leader since 1871, was appointed to the Bench in 1878, and post was taken by Mr. W. R. Meredith. was marked by unfortunate choice of fighting ground, as evidenced by his opposition to provincial rights and his sectarian appeals, first, to the Catholics by means of "Facts for the Irish Electors" in 1883, and later to the Protestants by means of "The Eyeopener" and other cries. Mr. Mowat was victorious in 1883, 1886, 1890 and 1894, and Mr. Meredith abandoned the hopeless task and retired in October, 1895, to the more serene atmosphere of the Bench. He was followed by Mr. G. F. Marter, who found one session sufficient, and resigned the leadership on April 2, 1896, since which time the office has been filled by Mr. J. P. Whitney.

Meantime in June, 1896, Sir Oliver, Mowat joined Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the appeal which landed the Liberals in office at Ottawa, and the "Little Premier" bade good-bye to the activities of the provincial field. He was succeded by Hon. A. S. Hardy, so long his faithful colleague, and member of the House at that time for 23 years. Mr. Hardy's name will ever be venerated for the painstaking, honest work he performed during his long public service. The one campaign which he conducted in 1898 left him with a narrow majority. The latest period of the Liberal regime pegan October 21, 1899, when, Mr. Hardy retiring owing to failing health, the Premiership was assumed by Hon. G. W. Ross. A spirited program of development of New Ontario and a policy of ameliorating the ills of old Ontario has marked Mr. Ross' entire administration. In appealing to the people in May, 1899, he also secured a small majority, and since then moves and countermoves lent uncertainty to the situation and general election was called to secure a decisive majority. The campaign just concluded was probably the most abusive in our political history, and the end will be received with a certain amount of satisfaction by the leaders of both sides and by the whole province at large.

Details of the results of the various general elections may be added
