Head of the French Branch of the Banking House Succumbs to Acute Bronchitis.

Paris, May 27.—Baron Alphonse de Rothschild, head of the French branch of the banking house bearing the name of Rothschild, and Governor of the Bank of France discovernor of the Bank of France, died yesterday morning at 4.30, from acute bronchitis ag-

grevated by gout.

The news of the baron's death caused

The news of the baron's death caused a deep impression among financiers generally. It was said that his death would probably momentarily influence the extensive interests in which the house is concerned, but that it would not have a lasting effect on the markets. The deceased will be succeeded as head of the Parls banking house by Baron Lamber de Rothschild of Brussels, whose business capacity has earnied him a world-wide reputation.

The burial of Baron Alphonse will be most simple, according to the strict rule of the Rothschild family, including a plain coffin without mourning tributes. The funeral, the date of which has not yet been fixed, will be the occasion of a notable tribute of respect. Baron Alphonse de Rothschild was the second son of Baron James de Rothschild, having succeeded his brother, the late Baron Edmond James de Rothschild at head of the Parls house, Baron Alphonse was born February 1, 1827. He was a governor of the Bank of France, a member of the Academy of Fine Arts, a member of the Academy of Fine Arts, a member of the Fernch Institute, and a commander of the Legion of Honor. The deceased baron leaves two children, Baron Gouard and Baroness Beatrix. He has two surviving brothers, Baron Gustav has a son, Robert, and two daughters, one of whom married Sir Edward Sassoon, a great friend of King Edward, and the other married Baron Lumber de Rothschild of Brussels, who has long represented the Rothschild interest at that capital, and who succeeds Baron Alphonse as head of the Parls banking house.
