NATION IS AS IT THINKS

Hence Chamberlain Advises Thinking Imperially.

Phrase Coined From Hamilton's "Learn to Think Continently" of American Revolutionary Name, and It May Become a Fiscal Reform Shibboleth—Future of England Lies in the Future of British Race Everywhere.

London, Jan. 20.—The Guild Hall was packed yesterday to hear Joseph Chamberlain speak. Mr. Chamberlain received a great ovation. He declared that the provincial centres of commerce of the United Kingdom had been heard from in regard to his tariff proposals; and he believed the same arguments he used in the provinces would appeal equally to Imperialist London. London would no longer be the world's clearing house if Great Britain's present relations with her colonies and the general neutral countries of the world were disturbed by a diminution in the multiplicity of the extent of the transactions which hitherto had been creating new wealth.

Called Loudly For Remedy.

His opponents claimed that the recent board of trade returns destroyed his contentions; but he intended to base his future arguments on these returns, as they proved that the growth of foreign exportations to the British colonies had greatly exceeded the growth of exportations from the Motherland. The position of Great Britain was deteriorating, and though he anticipated no immediate catastrophe the situation called loudly for some remedy. The framework of a new Empire must be built up under new conditions, by adopting the protective policy adopted by every other civilized nation and creating the bonds of the union with the colonies.

Mr. Chamberlain in an eloquent peroration pointed out that the struggle for life and existence in the future would not be between the cities or between kingdoms, but between mighty Empires. The minor states would come off badly.

Think Imperially.

"Profiting by the experience gained when the great jewel the British Empire ever possessed—the United States—left us for a separate existence, a new Empire had arisen, greater than any in the world, but the great work of keeping and making permanent this heritage remains to be solved. In the great revolution which separated us from the United States the greatest man that the revolution produced, in my judgment was Alexander Hamilton. He was a soldier and a statesman. He left a precious legacy to his countrymen when he said to them: 'Learn to think continually.'"

"I venture to give you a similar message: 'Learn to think imperially,' and remember that the future of this country lies in the future of the British race in our colonies and possessions."

His speech was cheered and applauded.

Another Report.

London, Jan. 20.—(C.A.P.)—Speaking at the Guild Hall yesterday, Mr. Chamberlain asked: "Was the policy of free exports adopted under circumstances absolutely different from our present position? Was this policy most conducive to the maintenance of our commercial supremacy? Above all, would this policy break through the bonds of the Empire and bring us closer to the great nations that were rising across the Seas? Would it prepare us for the struggle which must inevitably come?"

"What was the answer? If they had time to read the speeches of all his opponents they would find their cases substantially rested on one proposition. That was that under the policy of free imports, adopted some 50 years ago they were better off now than they were 30 or even 10 years ago, and it was said, 'Why not let well enough alone?' The argument had been triumphantly borne out by the recent board of trade returns but taken alone he could not accept them with satisfaction.

"Our exports to our own possessions have been increasing. If everything we lost from foreigners was gained from our colonies he would be satisfied, but in the colonies there was an increase of foreign goods imported greater than the increase of goods from the home country."

Devonshire Concerned Around.

Almost simultaneously with Mr. Chamberlain's exposition of his policy in the Guild Hall the Duke of Devonshire and Lord George Hamilton addressed at Liverpool an equally enthusiastic meeting, which was held under the auspices of the Unionist Free Food League. The Duke of Devonshire said he was coming more and more to believe that the Government was right in advocating a policy of retaliation against protectionist countries, but with Premier Balfour allowing himself to be dragged into the Chamberlain propaganda it would be impossible for the Unionists to maintain their alignment with the Government before the country if it was desired to differentiate between retaliation and protection. He said he feared the Chamberlain Commission, representing the highly organized industries, would be able to prepare a tariff scheme whereby they would benefit, and that they would be able to force it on the country to the detriment of the consumer and the less well-organized manufacturers.

The meeting passed a resolution declaring against a general protective system.

Church Burned Down.

Montreal, Jan. 20.—St. Cuno-gonde's Catholic Church was destroyed yesterday afternoon by a fire that broke out shortly before 2 o'clock. The loss is \$100,000. The insurance reaches \$80,000.

MR. FOY'S AMENDMENT.

Toronto Member Futs Up a Good Speech in the Legislature—The North Renews Vacancy.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—Mr. J. B. Lucas will have the floor in the Legislature this afternoon. He had "not got well warmed up to his subject yesterday" when 6 o'clock came around, but in the short time he was on his feet he delivered some strong thrusts, all the while in exceedingly good humor and self-possessed. Mr. Lucas will speak for an hour to-day, and will be followed by Mr. Preston, on the Government side, and Mr. Hoyle on the Conservative side.

Mr. Foy's Amendment.

Mr. Foy opened the debate yesterday and spoke for an hour. He was primed with new material, and scored many points. Mr. Foy concluded by moving the following amendment: "That the following words be added to the motion: And we also beg leave to express our strong disapproval of the delay in filling the vacancy in the north riding of Renfrew, caused by the death of the late John W. Munro, and more especially at the direction given by the Government to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to withhold the writ of election."

Has Become Shortwinded.

Mr. A. G. McKay followed, arguing forcibly that the delay in bringing on the protests was due to Conservative unpreparedness, and he finally launched into an exposition of Conservative election methods. He surprised everybody by talking no more than three-quarters of an hour. There were very few empty chairs. Col. Matheson and Mr. Reid of Addington, both of whom have been ill, lined up with the Opposition forces for the first time this session. Of the Government members, Mr. Barber of Halton, is still absent through illness.

The Assessment Inquiry.

Mr. Gibson made a statement about the committee appointed at the last session of the House to consider improvements to the assessment law. He said since the session a good deal had been done by way of perfecting and maturing the new measure. Although the committee had lapsed technically, he would like to have an informal meeting, because they had taken a great deal of interest in the subject, and were acquainted with the facts brought out. He would like the bill came up for its second reading to have it referred to the same committee.

Teniskaming Bill Friday.

Mr. Latchford on Friday next will bring in the bill to amend the Teniskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Act.

The House adjourned at 6 o'clock.

RESENTMENT TOWARD HAYS.

Government Names Him For Hitch in G.T.P. Negotiations.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—It is no secret that the recent negotiations between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway Company were conducted by cable. The Government will have nothing to do with Chas. M. Hays in the way of negotiations. Mr. Hays is "blamed for the company's failure to put up the \$5,000,000 deposit within the stipulated time. There are members of the Government who declare without reservation that the Grand Trunk Railway Company could have made the deposit as required by the contract had it chosen to do so. They insist that Mr. Hays planned the putting up of a belated deposit, in order to secure better terms from the Government, and bring action exposed the Government's railway policy to ridicule and prevented the appeal to the country, which Sir Wilfrid Laurier had fully decided upon. For these reasons Mr. Hays has gone away down in the Government's estimation. Mackenzie and Mann have correspondingly moved into the sunshine of ministerial favor. Mr. Hays may be unjustly blamed, but the Government has selected him for the object of its resentment and any further negotiations relating to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway will be conducted with officials in London.

FEDERAL CANDIDATES.

Brockville—The Reformers on Tuesday chose Daniel Derbush as their contest the riding for the Dominion House.

Warkworth—No decision was arrived at by the Liberals of East Northumberland regarding a candidate Tuesday. The convention adjourned for two weeks.

Centre Toronto—C. Robinson, K. C. was nominated on Tuesday night by the Liberals of this riding in convention assembled. Mr. Robinson accepted the honor.

Montreal—At the Liberal convention Tuesday nominating Victor Gosselin for Chambly and La Prairie, Hon. Mr. Prefontaine stated that the coming session would be as short as possible.

Mr. Burns Summoned.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—William Burns will appear in the police court this morning to answer the charge of attempting to cast an illegal vote. He was served with summons yesterday afternoon. This is the latest sensation in the scandal revealed by the investigation into the municipal election returns.

Resignation in Newfoundland.

Montreal, Jan. 20.—A private despatch was received here yesterday from St. John's, Nfld., saying that Hon. A. B. Morris, leader of the Opposition in the Colonial Assembly, had resigned and had been succeeded by A. F. Goodridge.

Awards Against the G.T.R.

Toronto, Jan. 20.—Justice McManis yesterday returned awards of \$5,000 and \$3,000 to relatives of Jacob D. Speers of Owen Sound against the G.T.R. Speers died as an after result of a collision.
