

## SOLDIERS BIDDEN FAREWELL AT CHRIST CHURCH YESTERDAY

Rev. C. J. Young, of Madoc, in Absence of Rector and Chaplain,  
Addressed Volunteer Artillerymen and Infantrymen.

"We wish you, farewell, and happiness and strength and courage." In these words our soldiers were bidden farewell at Christ church on Sunday morning. The speaker was the Rev. C. J. Young, B.A., of Madoc who took the place of the Rev. R. C. Blagrove, chaplain of the 49th Regiment Hastings Rifles.

It was fitting that the last Sunday in the hometown of many of the volunteers should be spent at divine service, where the moral lessons of conflict and of the personal individual battle might be emphasized and the soldiers and citizens learn from the present crisis a true appreciation of the spiritual facts of life.

The Thirty-Fourth Battery, Royal Canadian Field Artillery, and the Forty-Ninth Hastings Rifles volunteers between forty and fifty in number were the men attending church. The 15th volunteers did not leave the armories, being otherwise engaged. The volunteers occupied the center pews.

The service was impressive, the hymns being the great Christian odes of war and peace, and nationality—"Soldiers of Christ Arise," "O God of Love, O King of Peace," concluding with the verse "Give peace, O God, give peace again." "O God, our help in ages past," "God Save the King," "Our fair Dominion bless," and the organ postlude was "Rule Britannia." There was none of the usual church parade, but stern faced reality seemed to be felt by all. It cannot be denied, said the Rev. Mr. Young, that great changes must come after the termination of the trouble in Europe. The present time may be called a great epoch in history. It has come upon us with such suddenness that we can scarcely understand the facts.

St. Paul saw Jews at Corinth who had contended with bitter experiences in life, which he compared to a race in which many strove but only one took the prize. He preached temperance and subjection of the body. What a beautiful message to the present time!

have never been wrought without struggle, temperance, and never without shedding of blood. Probably this crisis will mark such an epoch of progress. The struggle which has already begun will bring forth notable results to the world. Humanity speaking we cannot say what the end will be. But we feel perfectly well that it will be the victory of our arms.

"We do not know the trouble you men will meet and how you will leave for your own homes, what struggles are before you, but we know as citizens of this town and county that you will conduct yourselves in soberness, temperance and chastity. You will be in the position of those not fighting only foes of human kind, but also spiritual enemies. You will meet them every day. You will meet these spiritual enemies in the field if it is your lot to go to the front, just as you have met them in your quiet homes."

"By self denial, self-restraint, you will win laurels over the world, the flesh and the devil."

"You will see the great responsibility belonging to you. Each has his own responsibility. May you be supported and encouraged in your undertaking."

"Again, my dear friends, you have answered the call and given your lives to a great responsibility. Life is passing swiftly. Life is a great and glorious heritage here, but it soon passes away."

"May you be strong in the conflict, fighting not in uncertainty, but careful in obedience to command. So shall you be honored at home, and revered by those to whom you belong. Should it be that God in His great providence does not permit you all to come back to your homes again, your names will be revered, your memory cherished, you who formed a part of the defenders, you who are strong in your duty to your empire and your king."

"We wish you farewell and happiness and strength and courage in order that upholding honor you may have strength to vanquish all temptations."

After service the artillerymen and infantry marched via Coleman and Bridge streets to the armories.
