SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST

LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and

cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within aine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Frice \$3.00 per-sere. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to re-luction in case of rough, scrubby or story and. Live stock may be substituted for utivation under certain conditions

ength of the steps of the soldiers low engaged in war. The longest step of all is that of the British infantry, which is thirty-one and a half inches. Germany and Switzerland come next, each doing thirty-one inches, and France, Italy and Austria each step out twenty nine inches. The shortest of all is found in the Russian army. The Czar's soldier's step is twenty-seven and a half inches, and he only does a hundred and twelve to the minute. This is beaten by the German, who does one hundred and fourteen to the minute. The Austrians step out at the rate of a hundred and fifteen; the French and Italian at a hundred
