The process has been distinctly of an evolutionary nature. One step has opened the way to another. Concession after concession has been granted to the people and all in apparently natural sequence. The rights of the individual have been given constantly broadening recognition and the actual power of the sovereign has proportionately decreased. As constituted at the present time the British government, notwithstanding the retention of the monarchial system, is as purely representative as any existing republic. In some respects it is more so. Never has England seen so many peaceful victories achieved as during the Victorian regime. Liberty won by the sword is apt to be overturned by the sword, but "liberty, slowly broadening down from precedent to precedent," is liberty established for all time. Such are the rights which England enjoys today.
