HOCKEY LEAGUE

The meeting of hockeyists held in Lamb's hall on Thursday evening was of an informal character, the main object of the meeting being to consider the formation of a league to include Lyn, Athens, Delta, Elgin, Newboro and Westport. It was thought that such a league would add greatly to the interest taken in the matches, and ensure a fair and thorough test of the ability of the respective teams. Messrs. Fred Barber and Charles Arnold were appointed to correspond with the clubs of the villages named and arrange preliminaries for a meeting of delegates, who will fix the schedule and make by-laws for the government of the league.

The first step necessary, of course, will be the organization of the various clubs, in order that any arrangements made may have official sanction, and this should be done without delay.

The position of the Athens club in respect to players was carefully canvassed at this meeting, and it was thought that, as usual, two teams could be formed.

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY NOTE

Thinking it might be of some interest to root growers through this section of the counties I thought I would give you my experience with this year's crop. I fitted up two acres and a half in the early spring and sowed carrots and onions in April and sugar beets and mangolds the first of May. On account of the great drought through May the roots never came up. The last week in May we spring-toothed the ground and ridged it up again, and sowed roots, while some of my neighbors plowed and sowed other grain on account of the lateness of the season. We have just finished harvesting our crop and we have raised:—

Sugar Beets.....1480 bushels

Mangolds.....560 "

Carrots.....240 "

Turnips.....85 "

Onions.....40 "

Total.....2405 "

Also cabbage, 850 heads.

Some of our cabbage weighed from 20 to 23 lbs stripped of their outside leaves.

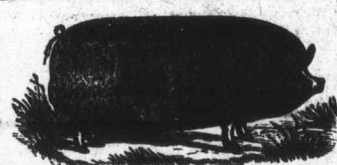
