CUSTOMS FEES

A .E. Pilkey, of the Customs Department, reports the following collections for the month of October at the different customs stations in this

Ridgetown, \$844.95. Blenheim, \$596.37 Glencoe, \$68.68. Tilbury, \$104.35. Romney, 98c. Rondeau, \$1,285.00 Chatham, \$8,551.61.

The collections in Chatham during October of last year were \$9,788.67, so that there is a decrease this year in October of \$1,237.06. This is a big decrease, but it is largely owing to the good corn crop last year and the poor one this year. Last year's collections for October were largely on corn harvesters, which were ship ped here in large numbers. This year of course owing to the failure of the corn crop there are very few harvest-

ers being shipped in.
Rondeau has shown up well this year with \$1,285.00 in collections. This is far in excess of any previous month's collections there, and is directly due to the duty on the coal shipped in by the Lake Erie. Nov that the new coal hoist is completed and working, Rondeau will no doubt develop into a lively customs port

Much of the success of the play depends upon the ward and the woman of the world, and both parts were satisfactorily sustained. In the latter character Marie Hunt made a favorable impression. As the ward, William Wagner gave an intelligent representation of the youth who has lost his head rather than his heart to the wiles of a scheming, beautiful woman, but who finally comes to an understanding of who are his friends.
