CRONJE GIVES UP.

Son of the Victim of Paardeburg Surrenders Klerksdorp.

Another Raid on the Railway Ruined—Free State Raiders Very Daring.

London, June 15.—The War Office issues the following dispatch from Lord Roberts.

"Pretoria Residency, June 14.—10.40 p.m.—Klerksdorp surrendered on June 9 to an armed party sent on by Hunter.

"Kitchener reports that the Boers attacked a reconnaissance train early this morning a few miles north of Klerksdorp. He sent out mounted troops and drove off the enemy before they could do damage. One man was killed and 11 wounded, including two officers.

"A messenger from Klerksdorp reports that Cronje, who commanded there, determined to surrender as soon as he knew for certain that Pretoria was in our possession. His example has been copied by many in the neighborhood. The court house is now said to be full of arms."

By the peaceful occupation of Klerksdorp, the British have gained a strategic position of some importance, as the town is not only the terminus of another railway to Johannesburg, but is within easy reach of the Kruonstad-Vierfontein railroad.

The Cronje, who surrendered the place, is a son of the famous Gen. Cronje, now a prisoner at St. Helena. The son was prominent during the siege of Mafeking.

Apart from the fact that Lord Roberts' despatch comes direct from Pretoria, showing the telegraph line is reopened, the only other point of interest is the fact that the Boers, whom Gen. Methuen was reported to have routed, have suddenly recuperated to attack a reconstruction train.

A despatch from Kimberley reports the capture of the well-known pugilist, "Jim" Holloway, who was an adjutant in the Boer army and who blew up the bridge at Fourteen Streams.

CAUSING MUCH TROUBLE.

London, June 15.—The optimism induced by Gen. Roberts' despatches in restoring communications with Pretoria has not altered the fact that the Free State raiders have taken over a thousand prisoners at Lindley and Rooval and retreated with them and their guns and that the raids may be repeated. Dewet's commandos have not been dispersed and whatever precautions may be taken there will be danger of another raid, since the railway cannot be absolutely protected by infantry battalions nor by artillery trained all along the line from Bloemfontein to Pretoria. The conquest of the northeastern section of the Free State has not yet been effected and operations by a series of columns from Heilbron, Lindley, Senekal and Ficksburg are rendered difficult by the transport problem.

Buller has cleared Laing's neck and Lyttelton has received the submission of the Wakkerstroom district, but the Boer army has not been captured. It has retired with all its guns and supplies and will fight again in the mountainous district remote from the railway. Botha's army has also withdrawn from the positions which it held for two days against Roberts' forces east of Pretoria, but it has not been dispersed, nor have the British taken either guns or prisoners.
