## BURGLAR HANGED.

Killed Grocer, Varcoe While Engaged in a Robbery.

A Policeman Shot His Confederate And he was Captured - Never Revealed His Identity.

Toronto, April 14. - Harry Williams, who murdered Grocer J. E. Varcoe on Nov. 9th last while engaged in robbing his store, was hanged this morning. The drop fell at 8.02 o'clock. Radcliffe, the public executioner, officiated and everything passed off quietly. The execution was originally set for Good Friday but the department of justice postponed it 24 hours owing to a question of its legality. When Williams heard of the reprieve he merely remarked, "That only means 24 hours longer."

The prisoner died without revealing his identity. He belongs to some good family in the province but persistently refused to disclose his real name. He said he had already brought enough trouble on his friends. Williams' killing of Grocer Varcoe was not premeditated.

He and a companion broke into Varcoe's place to rob it. Varcoe resisted, a struggle ensued and the grocer was fatally shot. Williams and his pal tried to escape. His pal was killed by a policeman. Williams was injured, jumped from a window and captured. An attempt was made to blame the shooting on the dead robber, but the jury found Williams guilty and he paid the penalty this morning. He manifested great indifference up to the last.

BOER LOSSES.

London, April 14. - The Daily Mail publishes this despatch, dated Friday, April 13, from Lorenzo Marques -

"The actual Boer losses to the end of March, including prisoners, are estimated at 12,000. At present there are 7,000 Boers in Natal and 37,000 in the Free State."

The Boers are manufacturing shells, especially Vickers-Maxims, in large quantities at the Beggie foundry, Johannesburg.

The Daily Telegraph has the following from Blandaagte, dated April 13: "The Boers are changing their tactics and are moving from Glencoe westward with a view of threatening our lines of communication to Ladysmith."

"On Tuesday a corps of carabineers and another of Thorneroff's Horse narrowly escaped being cut off owing to the treachery of a native guide."
