Judge Houston, who was chairman at the Salvation Army meetings held in the Opera House on Sunday, was a very interested listener to the speech made by Mr. Coombs.

The dog would eat as much as a full grown man, and still the woman would not part with him, and wanted the city to feed the whole lot.
