Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—Cables from Liverpool and Loudan came weak on Canadian cattle and prices show a further decline of ½c, with sales in the former market at 8½c to 9½c and in the latter at 0c 10c. Ranch cattle sold at 7½c to 5½c, and sheep were steady at 12c. This weakness is due to heavy supplies of home cattle being pressed upon the market, coupled with the liberal shipments from here. Present prices are said to be the lowest on record and exporters are losing barrels of money. Shipments last week were 8229 record and experiers are losing barrels of money. Shipments last week were \$229 cattle, \$67 sheep. Receipts were 1500 cattle 25, milch cows, 2000 sheep and lambs, 200 calves, 400 hogs, Owing to the unfavorable weather and the continued heavy supples of cattle and easy feeling prevails, but prices show little change. The demand was fair and a sumber were left over. Good cattle sold at 4c to 44c; fair, at 34c to 3%c; common, at 23%c to 3c. and interior at 1½c to 2½c per lb. The milch cows were a common hot and sold at \$30 to \$480 each. Grass-fed calves sold at 2c to 3e per lb., and young veals at 4c. Sheep sold at 3½c to 4c and lambs at 5c to 5%c per lb. Good tots of fat hogs sold at 6c is 6%c per lb.
