W. C. T. U. Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Wolfville branch of the W. C. T. U. was held on Thursday afternoon of last week at the rooms of the Board of Trade. The attendance of members was not large, but the meeting was an interesting and successful one. The officers for the ensuing year were appointed, and will be published in due time in the proper columns. The reading secretary, Mrs. A. E. Coldwell, read an interesting report of the doings of the society during the year. The union has met regularly and a number of enterprises have been carried on. These include work for the Labrador mission, to which a generous donation of clothing and other useful articles were given. Considerable work was also done in the interests of the local mission. During the summer months the union has been supplying flowers to the hospital at Halifax. The different Sabbath schools of the town were asked to assist and have responded generously. In February a mass meeting was held under the auspices of the union, addressed by ministers of the town and others. In the coming year it is hoped that the same energy may characterize the labors of the union in the interest of 'Home and God and Native Land.'
