THE ACADIAN is glad to present the cards of three gentlemen this week who have consented to allow themselves to be put in nomination as candidates for seats in the town council at the approaching elections. They are all well-known as energetic and capable business men, and citizens of our town for the coming term. Messrs. Chambers and Hales have already given splendid service to the town as members of the board and Mr. Burgess, who's untried as regards this particular kind of work, has ever evinced a deep interest in town matters and is generally regarded as a young man of excellent business qualifications. At the present time it is eminently necessary that we should have good men to manage our town government, and with Mr. T. L. Harvey for mayor, and Messrs. Hales, Chambers and Burgess for councillors the affairs of our town will be well looked after. Other names have been mentioned as candidates for civic honors, but with good men willing to undertake the duties of the office it seems altogether unnecessary that the town should be put to the expense and worry of an election.

At the fifteenth annual meeting of the American Mathematical Society, held at Baltimore on Dec. 30th and 31st, two valuable papers were presented by Dr. E. Gordon Bill, of Yale University, son of C. R. Bill, Esq., of this town. Dr. Bill's subjects were: "Existence 'im Kleinen' of a space curve which minimizes a definite integral," and "An a priori existence theorem in three dimensions for the calculus of variations." Among the large number of celebrated educationists who attended and took part in the program at this important gathering were such men as President H. S. White, of Vassar College; Prof. Frank Morley, of Johns Hopkins University; Prof. G. A. Miller, of the University of Illinois; Prof. G. A. Bliss, of the University of Chicago; Prof. Edward Kiamer, of Columbia University; and Prof. Virgil Snyder, of Cornell University.

Rev. W. T. Stackhouse, who some months ago was appointed general superintendent of Baptist Missions in the west, has resigned to accept the appointment of organization secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement of the Baptist church in Canada. He will go to Toronto to make his headquarters in February.

The Dominion Parliament met at Ottawa on Wednesday with the usual formalities. The session promises to be an interesting one.

Town Council.

An organized meeting of the council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor and all the Councilors present.

Annual reports were read from Mayor Black, and the chairmen of the Streets, Water, Sewerage, Fire and Poor Committees.

Reports were also presented by the School Board, Health Officer and Inspector of Plumbing, and the Recorder presented a draft of an act to amend chapter 122 of the acts of 1907—An act to enable the town of Wolfville to borrow money for electric light and power purposes. This was accepted and approved and ordered to be sent to one of the representatives of the county for presentation to the Legislature at its next session.

On motion L. W. Sleep was appointed returning officer and A. E. Caldwell poll-clerk for the ensuing civic elections.

The arrangement of the material and for the printing of the year book was entrusted to the Finance Committee.

Prohibition Gains.
In the Ontario local vote last week the net result was: temperance majorities in 70 municipalities, and liquor majorities in 20. Twenty-nine municipalities voted on repeal, 27 in favor of the law and two voted for repeal. There were no new contests, in which as carried local option, 21 poll of majorities for local option, but less than the three-fifths requirement, and 8 majorities against local option. Over one hundred bars were closed by voting, and nine places are yet to hear from.

The Movement Spreads.

After two weeks of trial, during which several thousand Cleveland young people have put practical Christianity to test by resolving daily to do only those things which Jesus would do in business, social, home and school life, and to the best of their ability carrying out their resolve, the movement has assumed a much larger and more important outlook. Steps are now being taken to give it an international scope, and it is expected that within a very short time at least six million young people will be pledged to this test of the practicality of the Christ teaching and example.

The two weeks' campaign in Cleveland was illuminative and educative, and society generally became interested, and there was much speculation as to what the results would be. Some of the young people reported that it was impossible for them to do only as Jesus would do in their daily employment, because their employers constantly required them to do things which they knew Jesus would not have countenanced. Others found it an easier matter to follow the Christ example. Evidently all of them found it profitable to try the experiment, and the enlargement of the campaign shows that on the whole it was deemed a success.

One great value of such a campaign as this lies in its influence for good upon the business and social life of the community. Most business men in this country, as church members, supposedly, follow the Christ example as believers in and disciples of the lowly Nazarene. But modern business methods and practices are too often based upon something far different, and it is an easy matter for the consciences of men to adapt themselves to conditions as they find them rather than to fight what seems to be a losing battle for something better. And if the Cleveland movement has had the effect of arousing conscience and making business conditions in that city more honest and honorable, it will have accomplished much, not taking into account the benefit that must have come to the young people directly engaged in it.

And, after all, what hope can there be for the world and genuine betterment of conditions in it until men practice the religion they profess and make real the teaching of Christ, which now holds rank in too many so-called Christian minds only as an idealistic theory, and which embodies in it that far-reaching gospel of the universal fatherhood of God and the equal universal brotherhood of man?
