## RUSSIANS DRAWING UP NEW

Russian Fire Murders  
Petrograd—The German attacks on Petrograd to the west of Warsaw yesterday.

terday were conducted with absolute disregard to the consequences, and according to a report reaching here, tremendous losses were incurred. The German method of throwing column after column into close ranks, the men marching shoulder to shoulder was evidence of the determination to take this position, which is on the direct road to Warsaw and nearer to Warsaw than any other fighting centre on the Lodz front.

In spite of the murderous fire of the Russians the German infantry lay in the shallow trenches dug out with their bayonets and hands at a distance of 200 paces from the Russian entrenchments and brought up their artillery to within 800 paces of the Russian position.

The Army Messenger declares that while the Germans were moving forward yesterday from Lask they attacked Pabianitz, 10 miles southwest of Lodz, in close ranks and forced the Russians to give ground, but with the approach of darkness the Russians stopped the advance of the Germans and inflicted heavy losses on them by the continued use of their armored automobiles on the Lask Pabianitz highway. Zdunska, Wola, Lask and Pabianitz marked the successive steps of the attempted German advance on Warsaw.

**Movement on Cracow Develops**  
The Russian movement enveloping Cracow continues slowly but successfully, according to information reached Petrograd. The centre of operations has shifted to the southward to the foothills of the Carpathians, on the left wing of the Russian front, which extends from Velitchka, six miles from Cracow, and within the outer circle of the Cracow forts, to New Sadebo, 70 miles south-east of Cracow. Here the Austro-German right is attempting a wide outflanking movement, heavily reinforced with German troops from Belgium.

Answer to  
Liquor Advt. No. 2  
Can We Afford It?

1. This is a practical question, and demands an answer. The Liquor Traffic takes from the people of Brandon about \$248,000.00 per year for liquid poison, as medical science has declared all alcoholic drinks. What do the people get? If a man spends a dollar in boots he has the goods and the merchant has the money. The boots assist the man in his work. If a man spends a dollar in drink it is one dollar lost to the community.

## CAN WE AFFORD IT?

2. According to the Labor Bureau of Ontario the ordinary man spends every hundred dollars of his wages as follows: 43 per cent. for food, 14 per cent. for rent, etc., 5 per cent. for fuel and light, 15 per cent. for clothing, 23 per cent. for other things. Taking this expert as a basis, if the bars were closed in Brandon there would be an approximate increase in expenditures in the following articles of legitimate business, viz.: Groceries, bread, etc., \$106,640; rents, real estate, etc., \$34,920; fuel and light, \$12,400; clothing, etc., \$37,200; books, jewelry, insurance, etc., \$57,040. This money is now lost to the business of Brandon.

## CAN WE AFFORD IT?

3. The Hotel Business is a Separate and Distinct Business by itself. There is no reason for having a bar-room in a hotel any more than in a private house. Local Option Does Not Affect the Hotel Business. The Liquor Traffic has no concern for the welfare of the travelling public, as witness, boarded up houses after local option prevails. Why? The travelling public still need accommodation.

4. The Liquor Advt. calls the Liquor Trade an industry. What is the product of this industry? Drunkards, Criminals, Paupers, Orphans, Beggars, Suicides, Insane People, Etc. \$1,970,000 invested in this industry, employing 317 people. The Liquor Traffic employs less per capital invested than any other business, and demands more from the people.

## CAN WE AFFORD IT?

5. The Evil Character of the Liquor Traffic is certified by the demand for "early closing during the war." The Bar-room is branded as a dangerous spot in the city. The Liquor Party are making the early closing order a plea for protection. If it is deemed wise to close during the war it is wiser to close the bar forever. If it is acknowledged a good thing to close the bar at 7 p.m., it is the Right thing to close it forever.

## CAN WE AFFORD IT?

YES, Brandon can well afford to close up the Liquor Business (?) and refuse to run any more bar-rooms. No danger of the Bailiff's Flag. The Bailiff follows the Booze. The Liquor Party says: "Don't be sympathetic; be selfish"—that is the soul of the system. That means, "Be blind and the blind will lead you into the ditch." Blind men and women vote for the bar-room. Unselfish citizens oppose it.
