Short Agriculture Courses At a number of points throughout the country short courses of four or five days' duration will be conducted regularly every winter or at the most convenient time of

the year. The subjects under discussion will be those of most interest to the district. These give an opportunity for local dis-

District Agents

Representatives will be appointed in some sections this season if the properly trained men are to be had. These men must have had practical experience on farms and a college training in addition. They will become a part of the community in which they are appointed and will assist the farmers in any and every problem which may arise. Orginization is one of the principal lines of endeavor.

Live stock problems, seed and cultivation, fertilizer, drainage, and various problems will come under their particular supervision.

Every man will have an office properly equipped for his work. centrally located, in order that the largest number of farmers may find it convenient to call.

- Field Crop Competitions

These will be encouraged under somewhat different management than previously, in order that every Agricultural Society may feel like entering them. Hand in hand with them will go the Seed Fairs. "More Seed and Better Seed" must be the motto for New Brunswick.

Selection of seed as practiced by some must be encouraged.

The growing of clover seed must be carefully fostered, because the growing of clovers is absolutely essential to the unkeep of the soils

Maritime soils seem naturally acid. The use of limestone as a corrective must be carefully followed; perhaps some demonstralater, after careful tests were made

Drainage is one of the correctives for acidity. While it is true that underdrainage cannot be followed systematically as in some sections, nevertheless there are an innumerable number of small week than farm it anywhere aareas which require the use of tile. It is also true that many are not thoroughly convinced that it will pay to under-drain-demonstration is the only plan—small demonstration plots in many sections.

A ditching machine cannot always be used to advantage here. Often it is cheaper and easier and quicker to install by hand. A supply of tile at reasonable

prices is a matter for futher consideration.

Fertilizers

The use of fertilizers is one of the principal questions in New Brunswick. Care needs to be exercised lest they be used extravagantly. Their use with clover and farmyard manure should be fostered. Doubtless careful experiment may be undertaken throughout the country.

The purchase and distribution requires rigid supervision.

Beekeeping

Proper inspection must be carried on to protect the present beekeepers and assistance must be given to those who are not conversant with the best methods.

The bees in the province are quite free from disease and must continue so, but thorough inspection and care must be maintained. The proper strains of bees must 6-21, Victoria. be introduced.
