UNIQUE GOLD COIN.
The wonderful and unique coin which has been purchased for the British Museum in London is the only authentic example remaining of the gold coinage of the Anglo-Saxon King, Offa, who reigned between 757 and 796. This Mercian prince was a close friend of Charlemagne, as evidenced by the fact that he received many presents from the Emperor. The coin, although struck by a Christian king, bears a Mohammedan inscription in Arabic. At the period when the coin was issued the Arabic dinar formed part of the gold currency of Europe, and it is surmised that on this account Offa caused an exact imitation to be struck for his own use. Probably the artist was ignorant of Arabic, nevertheless, he succeeded in inscribing the Arabic characters so clearly that they can easily be deciphered to-day. The inscription runs as follows: "There is no other God but the one God. He has no equal—Mahomet is the apostle of God."

White knocked a pop fly to right field which should have been an easy out, thus retiring the side and ending the game with Nanaimo victorious on an inning to spare, but Shepherd missed the catch and Wintemute came home, tying up the score, White going to second and scoring on Little's muff of J. Lill's grounder. On both sides a total of eleven runs were scored and not a single one was earned. A total of seventeen errors gives one an idea of the kind of ball both teams put up, although it might be said a strong wind and a high sun made the judging of the ball most difficult. RAILWAY OFFICIALS ROSE FROM RANKS

The railways of the North American Continent employ over a million and a half men who are paid considerably more than a billion dollars in wages in a single year. These great enterprises demand the highest degree of efficiency and ability from their directing chiefs and managers and our railway presidents are admittedly among the ablest men of the day.

But while they demand the utmost in individual service the railways offer to the ambitious and capable youth wonderful opportunities for advancement. It is from the ranks and from the ranks alone that the generals of the railway armies are chosen. The big Grand Trunk system affords some very striking instances of how ability plus industry can win recognition. Mr. E. J. Chamberlain has risen from the position of time keeper in the car shops of the Central Vermont Railway to the presidency of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific Railways and their subsidiary companies, comprising nearly 9000 miles of track. He has never spared himself and has little use for that type of employee who has been described as knowing two stations on the line, "Sundown" and "Payday."

The recent changes in the ranks of the vice-presidents of the Grand Trunk System led to the elevation of Mr. Frank Scott to the vice-presidential rank. Thirty years ago, two boys entered the treasurer's department of the Grand Trunk. They were both Canadians and both born in Montreal. Young Scott and young Dalrymple, for the other boy was J. E. Dalrymple, now the vice-president in charge of the traffic on the company's lines, worked side by side for several years. Mr. Dalrymple was later transferred to the traffic side of the organization and has gone from post to post on an even upward grade until three years ago he was made vice-president and was given the important task of looking after the company's freight and passenger traffic.

Mr. Scott, on the other hand, specialized in the financial branches of the railway's work and his recent promotion to the vice-presidency was a fitting recognition of his ability. This had already been marked by his being chosen President of the Society of Railway Financial Officers of America.

Few railways can duplicate this record of having two vice-presidents who have risen from junior clerkship in the service, without having to leave the organization in which they had their first business training in order to win laurels. Their successes should be an inspiration to the thousands of young men employed in the company's system.

For, in the case of the Grand Trunk these are by no means isolated examples of advancement from small positions to important offices. Many of the men now superintending the various branches of the company's operations have climbed step by step up the ladder. Another appointment announced this month was that of Mr. Walter H. Ardley as Comptroller in charge of all accounting. Mr. Ardley for the past six years has been General Auditor of the System. He won his spurs and experience right in the Grand Trunk offices. His schooldays were spent at the City of London College, under the shadow of St. Paul's Cathedral and it was as a clerk in the audit office of the Grand Trunk that he began his railway career.

It is to the young men of today that the directors are looking for their supply of executive officers in the future.

STRENGTH OF ARMY UNITS

In order that readers may have at hand a memorandum of the strength of army units in the belligerent nations, we give the following, which is taken from an exchange. It is not complete, but is doubtless accurate as far as it goes. Readers would do well to keep the memorandum at hand for future reference.

GREAT BRITAIN

Brigade of Infantry—Four battalions and administrative and medical units. Total 4,000 men.
Cavalry Brigade—Two regiments of four squadrons each. Total 800 men.
Brigade of Artillery—Three batteries, eighteen guns; heavy artillery, twelve guns; field howitzers, two batteries, horse artillery, two batteries.
Division—Sixty-four guns, twelve howitzers and four heavy field guns; 15,000 combatants.

FRANCE

Army Corps—Two infantry divisions, one brigade of cavalry, one brigade of horse and foot artillery, one engineers' battalion, one squadron of train. Total 40,000 men.
Infantry Division—Two brigades of infantry, one squadron of cavalry, twelve batteries. Total 12,000 men and forty-eight guns.

Brigade—Two regiments of three battalions each. Total 6,000 men.
Regiment—Three battalions of four companies each. Total 3,000 men.

Battalion—Four companies of 250 men each. Total 1,000 men.
Cavalry Division—Two and sometimes three brigades; 3,200-4,800 men.

Brigade of Cavalry—Two regiments of eight squadrons, with two batteries of artillery.

Regiment of Cavalry—Four squadrons; 800 men.
Squadron of Cavalry—Two hundred men.

RUSSIA

Battalion of Infantry—Eight hundred men.
Squadron of Cavalry—One hundred and twenty-five men.

GERMANY

Army Corps—Its staff, two infantry divisions, two regiments of field artillery, three squadrons of cavalry, a company of pioneers, a bridge train, field bakeries, telegraph troops, field hospital, etc., one or two batteries of heavy field howitzers or mortars and a machine gun group. Total 40,000 men.

Infantry Division—Two brigades. Total 12,000 men.

Brigade—Two regiments. Total, 6,000 men.

Regiment—Three battalions of four companies each. Total, 3,000 men.

Battalion—Four companies of 250 men each. Total, 1,000 men.

Regiment of Field Artillery—Nine batteries of field guns and three of field howitzers; seventy-two pieces.

Battery—Six guns.

Brigade of Cavalry—Two and occasionally three regiments. Total, 1,000 to 2,400 men.

Regiment of Cavalry—Four squadrons of 200 men each. Total, 800 men.
