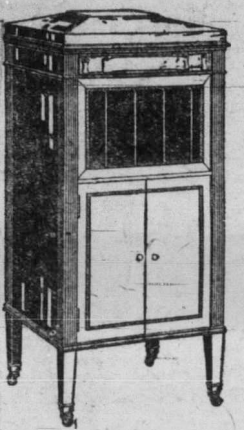

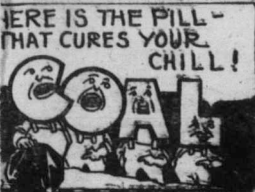

Montreal, June 30.—The sixty-two year old veteran George S. Lyon, of Montreal, put up the finest struggle of yesterday's fight for the Canadian golf championship and Maria Greer, of Grand Mere, put in a record score of 68 for the course.

Financial Conference.  
Paris, June 30.—The conference of the financial conference of Paris has been fixed by council of the League of Nations, which has decided it shall be held July 25.

To Pass on Steel Mergers.  
Montreal, June 30.—The directors of the Dominion Steel Corporation have fixed July 15 at Halifax for the date of special general meeting of shareholders to pass on terms on which corporation will come into British Empire Steel merger.

The Democratic Platform.  
San Francisco, June 30.—Open warfare on prohibition, the Irish question and other troublesome issues of the platform began yesterday in a stormy committee hearing at the Democratic national convention while in private the leaders continued their negotiations for a settlement to keep the hostilities from spreading later to the floor of the convention itself.

Shamrock IV Wins.  
Sandy Hook, June 30.—Shamrock IV, which will meet the Resolute for the America's cup, yesterday defeated her trial horse, the 23 metre Shamrock, by 3 minutes, 7 seconds.

N. S. Steel and the Mergers.  
Montreal, June 30.—President McDougall, of the N. S. Steel and Coal Co., Ltd., announced yesterday that as a result of negotiations between himself, President Norcross, of the Canadian Steamship Lines, and Roy M. Wolvin, president of the Dominion Steel Corporation, with Colonel Grant Morden, the chief executives of the Canadian enterprises had succeeded in securing a concession by which cumulative preference shares will be given for common shares instead of non-cumulative preferred shares as previously arranged.

Lawn Tennis Championship.  
Wimbledon, June 30.—Wm. T. Tilden, of Philadelphia, and Zeno Shimizu, of Japan, will be the competitors in the finals of the British lawn tennis singles championships. Winner must defeat Gerald L. Patterson, of Australia, in challenge round for championship.

Col. Morden Goes to England.  
Montreal, June 30.—Colonel Grant Morden on the eve of his departure on a five weeks' visit to England, said last night that he had agreed with the boards of the Dominion Steel Corporation and Nova Scotia Steel Company to earmark approximately \$20,000,000 of the \$25,000,000 he had arranged to secure, for the development and improvement of the undertakings of the two companies.

Fewer Men Employed.  
Montreal, June 30.—The Dominion Steel Corporation stated yesterday they had four thousand fewer men employed now than in 1914, with the output per man appreciably less.

Cancellation Board.  
Ottawa, June 30.—Judge R. D. Owen has been appointed chairman of the cancellation board in the dispute between the Commercial Telegraphers and the Canadian Pacific Railway.

### THE POOR BOOTBLACK

To the Editor of The Gleaner.  
Sir,—I cannot refrain from offering a few comments in answer to the contribution to your People's Column by a correspondent on the question of "shines."

For the past year or two, as everyone in the country is aware, there has been a general increase in the cost of living, the reasons for which are no numerous and so varied that I will not dwell upon that side of the question. Whether it is a cause or a result, the fact remains that wages have been pretty generally increased to enable the average person to meet the increase in the cost of living, so that I feel safe in saying most of the people who are working for a weekly wage or are on a salary have felt no great deprivation. But the poor boot-black who has to depend upon the whims and fancies of the public is, in my opinion, one of those who must be having a rather hard time of it to make both ends meet. I am not very much up on his line of goods, but, judging from present conditions, I am willing to wager that the cost of his material has about doubled over that of a year or two ago. No doubt the rent of his home, where he probably has ten or twelve children—may be the mother of our best Canadian—has more than doubled, not to speak of the cost of food, clothing, etc. He has to have food, clothing, heat and shelter just the same as the rest of us, strange as it may seem, and what is more, he has to buy it in the same country and pay the same price for it.

Your correspondent is probably a wealthy sportsman who can sit on a porch on a shelf in his room and get a real shine once a year! Surely, if he were a real man he'd never be "startled" by 15 cents.
