# IN NELSON DISTRICT

Present Condition of the Hall Mines Smelter-A Streak of Luck.

PROMISING FIND OF MICA

Nelson Squatters on Government Lots Notified to Quit-Bank of British Columbia Opens in Sandon-Burglaries in Nelson-School Allowance.

Nelson Miner: The foundation for the new blast furnace of the Hall mines smelter is nearly completed, but a week will be required for the drying of the concrete before any building can be done. The columns and deck plates are on the ground, and all the rest of the machinery is on the road and is almost daily expected to arrive. It will still be five or six weeks before the furnace will be completed and the capacity of the smelter will be raised to 330 tons per day, the

new furnace adding 200 tons. At present the capacity of the tramway is up to the mines. The smelter is now handling from 110 to 120 tons per day, and the output of the mines is at present only about 80 or 90 tons per day. Much energy is now being devoted to extending the main tunnel of the mine and making ready to sink new shafts from it. By the time the new furnace is in operation the mines will be in a position to put out between 200 and 300 tons per day, and the balance of the capacity of the plant will be taken up with commercial work. During the past week the ore from the Hall mines has been unusually good, that is, it is much richer than the average that has been taken

out in the past. The new roaster furnace is nearly comoleted and is only waiting now for fire brick to finish the fire box. The flue for the roaster which is to connect with the big stack is under construction and rap-

idly nearing completion. The reverberatory furnace is within three or four days of completion, but, like the roaster, is now waiting for the arrival of fire brick. Everything is in first class condition and work progresses

The assay office is still busy with out-side ores which have been submitted, and the outlook is that when the new furnace, which will be interchanged for lead, is in operation, that a great deal of Slocan ore will be handled. The smelter people are very eager for the construc-tion of the Crow's Nest Pass road and the building of the branch from the crossing into the Slocan. It will greatly facilitate matters and permit the handl-

ing of much more ore. A large addition is being built to Mr. Sicotte's boarding house at the smelter, and the building generally is being put in good shape for the winter.

The recent find of mica near Slocan Crossing, previously mentioned in these columns, promises to turn out exceedingly well. This claim (the Mica King, located by C. Freer) is situated about two and a half miles from the railway track, a few hundred yards from the Slocan trail, and is about 500 feet higher than the railway grade. Its low altitude, near location, plenty of timber, etc., and last but not least, its good surface showings, combine facilities not usually found in mica mining. A few shots put in across a face of 24 feet exposed a deposit of mica varying from a few inches to two feet in thickness extending into the rock. The specimens taken out are very clear and of good quality. It is understood that some of them sent east for inspection have been favorably reported on, and the owners have several offers for the prospect. The outlook is that it will continue improving with development, and that Kootenay will have a rich mica mine in the

near future. Stipendary Magistrate Fitzstubbs will oday cause notices to issue against all squatters on government land, particularly in block 70, ordering them to vacate forthwith. Mr. Fitzstubbs has received instructions from headquarters and is satisfied that he will have the support of the government in this action.

Nelson Tribune: Although the Slo-can section of West Kootenay has attracted the attention of mining men for four years, and has shipped in that time hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of ore, it was without banking facilities, other than the facilities furnished by the banks at Nelson, until Tuesday of this week. On that day the bank of British Columbia established a branch at Sandon. The chartered banks of Canada have large capital and are conservatively managed. When they establish branches it is a sure indication that the town in which they are established is the center of a country whose business will support a heart. a bank. From this it will be seen that Kootenay is a prosperous country, for there are five branches of three of Cana-da's greatest banks already established within its boundaries, namely, branches of the Bank of British Columbia and of the Bank of Montreal at Nelson; branches of the Bank of Montreal and of the Bank of British North America at Rossland, and a branch of the Bank of British Columbia at Sandon. The bank at Sandon was opened and will be managed temporarily by G. V. Holt, the manager of the bank's branch at Nelson. The Bank of British Columbia is the province's oldest chartered bank, and is said to be a little slow in its movements, but when its management gets a move on, the movement is as rapid as any of

ts competitors. The more prominent and loyal citizens of Kaslo are somewhat chagrined that the Bank of British Columbia should have established a branch of its institution at Sandon, while the larger town is still without adequate banking facilisties. The new branch opened for business on Tuesday last, and J. C. Eaton, manager of the Whitewater mine, drew the first check. It is now rumored that a large and wealthy eastern bank will establish a branch at this point at an early date, provided local influences do not prove strong enough to prevent. A gang of crooks, realizing that the government does not afford the people of Nelson police protection, this week commenced a systematic campaign of house-breaking. On Tuesday night the
