Malicious Attack on King George.

LONDON, Jan. 2.
Edward F. Mylius, who is connected with Edward H. James in the publication of the Liberator, was arrested, taken before a Magistrate and re-manded. The preliminary proceed-ings were in camera, and the exact charges against Mylius has not been divulged. It is expected that he was connected with the sale and distribution of the Liberator in England. The journal is published in Paris. The police have been on the look-out for those responsible for the issue of the Liberator, on account of scandalous and seditious attacks upon the Royal Family. In the November issue an article appeared reviling the scandal, long ago disproved, that King George was married at Malia in 1850 to a daughter of a British Ad-miral. This was followed by a state-ment, signed by Edward Mylius, re-voicing the attack upon the King, and suggesting that the only way he can be dealt with in England is by re-volution.

The Trusts and Corporations.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.
The prosecutions of the Standard Oil Company and the American To-bacco Company, under the Sherman Anti-Trust Law, will come before the Supreme Court for the second time on the resumption of the court term this month. As soon as the cases are dis-posed of the court will take up the constitutionality of the Corporation Tax and provisions of the Payne-Archer tariff. The Standard Oil and Tobacco cases have put the Sherman Anti-Trust Act to the most crucial test of the twenty years of its exist-ence, while the Corporation tax cases place on trial the power of the Fed-eral Government over all Corpora-tions. It is contended that if the Supreme Court affirms the decisions, resolving the big trusts, the Govern-ment will be forced to license Corpora-tions and allow legitimate business to proceed. About twenty-five mil-lions are involved in the Corporation tax cases.

Canada and Reciprocity

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.
The Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, and William Paterson, Min-ister of Customs, leave for Washing-ton the latter part of this week to re-sume the trade negotiations with the United States, which were begun at the Ottawa conference in Novem-ber last. The Canadian Ministers will meet President Taft and Secretary Knox on Saturday of next week, when the members of the conference will take up a detailed discussion of the proposals from both sides.

New Year Honors.

LONDON, Jan. 2.
The New Year's List of Honours comprises six Privy Counsellors, the most notable being Sir Alexander Wil-liam Murray, Master of Elibank, the chief Liberal whip, and William Abrah-am, M.P. for Rhondda Valley division of Glamorganshire since 1885, who is the son of a working collier.
There are nine baronets, the best known being Charles Wright Macara, Chairman of the Committee of Inter-national Federation of Master Cotton Spinners and Manufacturers' Associa-tion since 1904, and President of the English Federation of Master Cotton Spinners' Association during the past six years.
Among the new knights are Joseph Lyons, the well known caterer, the honour being conferred for his ser-vices in supporting the territorial movement; Henry J. Wood, Orchestral Conductor, and Sidney Colvix, Keeper of Prints and Drawings in the British Museum since 1884.
The list of promotions in the order of St. Michael and St. George include Lord Robson, formerly Attorney Gen-eral, and Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Cana-dian Minister of Justice, in connec-tion with the recent Fisheries Arbi-tration at the Hague; and George P. Gibbons, Chairman of the Canadian section of Waterways Commission, in connection with the treaty concerning the boundary waters between Canada and the United States.
Among the honours in connection with the establishment of Union of South Africa is a baronetcy conferred upon Dr. Jameson, who led the fam-ous raid on the Transvaal in 1895.
The Canadians knighted by King George among the New Year's hon-ours are Hon. Charles James Towns-bend, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia; Messrs. Mac-kenzie and Mann, the railway mag-ates and contractors; Mr. Tait, for-merly in charge of the State Railways in Australia. Lieut.-Col. Henry R. Smith, I.S.O., Sergeant-at-Arms in the House of Commons at Ottawa, has been made a C.M.G.

THE QUEEN OF ENGLAND.

In business matters Her Majesty is clear and expeditious, methodical and systematic. Her mornings are generally taken up with attending to the voluminous correspondence that ar-rives by every post. Her secretary and lady-in-waiting submit their let-ters and the Queen gives instructions concerning them. She quickly grasps the main issue of a question and soon makes up her mind and has never been known to lay aside a matter of the ground that to express an opinion thereon is irksome or difficult; but should any letter require further con-sideration it is held for a day, when a decision is given and almost in-variably adhered to. Every consid-eration is shown to those privileged to serve the Queen, and before signifying her pleasure as to the personal at-tendance of members of her house-hold Her Majesty will often inquire whether they may not have some other engagement, the breaking of which would be inconvenient to them. Busy though the Queen is—and one has seen her for twenty years has never been known to lay aside a matter of acquaintance with and takes part in all that relates to the management of the household. Every servant is known to her, and their comfort is as much a matter of concern to her as her royal mistress as that of any one else. In fact, no detail of life wears the Queen, hence the reason of her sym-pathies are wide and all her days full of work.—Sir Clement Kinlock-Cooke, in the December Number of the North American Review.

Shannahan On Sticks.

"Oh, what a lot o' sticks were out yesterday," says Tucker, "and, oh, what a burden they bore. Did they strike you what a useful implement a stick is, how many tasks it can per-form and how handy it is. Men are improved in their appearances by a stick; men whom you'd think you'd equal on working days when they come down without the stick, are elevated to supreme loftiness on holidays when they get hold to a stick. No matter how down and out a man may be, if he holds on to the stick there is hope. Ambassador's Bones Found.

A skeleton found in a wood near the village of Quitzw, Germany, may turn out to be that of Lord Bathurst the English Ambassador at Vienna, who disappeared on the 25th of November, 1809, as he was returning to England.
The Ambassador's mysterious disappearance caused great excitement throughout Europe. Early in the spring of 1809, Lord Bathurst had been sent on a secret mission to the Vienna Court, and at the conclusion of the peace meeting at Schonbrunn, on the 18th of October of the same year, he started on the journey, and travelled from Berlin under the name of Koch, a merchant. On November 25 he arrived in Perleberg. Here he entered an hotel beside the posting station. In the evening, when the jour-neymen should have been resumed, Lord Bathurst was missing. His overcoat was found later on a heap of wood in the cellar of the posting station, and his leggings in a wood near the vil-lage of Quitzw.
There was a secret military inquiry into Lord Bathurst's disappearance, and a rumor was circulated that he had been murdered by the order of Napoleon. This rumor was credited in some quarters, as, at the time, the enemy against France in England had reached its highest stage.

How Fat Cattle Are Massaged for the Market

Farmers here and there have begun to practise a new method of bringing their fat cattle, of which the bulk is sold this week to the pink of per-fection required by the very exacting requirements of buyers of beef.
On one large farm a number of men have been told off during the last few weeks to massage the cattle several times a day. The animals are brushed and rubbed with hardly less energy and care than a good groom expends on a show horse. The re-sults are astonishing. The coats of the animals grow satiny and suggestive of the highest state of health. The rubbing causes the muscles to swell so that all the hollows are filled up and the cattle are firm to the touch, a mode of judgment on which dealers and butchers much rely.
The increase in price following such treatment has more than justified the trouble expended; and it is probable that the health of the animals is greatly improved, to the benefit of the consumer. "Passive exercise," as one of the originators of the method said, is substituted for active, with equal advantage to the increase in weight and the improvement in health of the stock.
To make celery slightly and crisp, cut white, tender stalks into two inch lengths and score the pieces length-wise about half an inch from each end until both ends are fringed. Drop them into a pan of ice water in which a slice of lemon is soaking and let stand for half an hour before serv-ing. Dry thoroughly before putting on the table.
A recipe for sugar cookies is as follows: Four even teaspoonfuls of flour, one even teaspoonful of soda, two even teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar, one heaping coffee-cupful of butter, two teaspoonfuls of sugar and milk enough to make a pastry. Mix the flour, soda, cream of tartar and butter and rub together. Put in the sugar, break in two eggs, add a little vanilla and the milk. Roll out, enclosing and bake.
