It is that in no mean praise, I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that MONDAY, the TWENTY-FIFTH day of JANUARY instant, be set apart for the purpose aforesaid, to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday throughout this Colony, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
