We feel that we are losing more than a friend, more than a leader, and although we sincerely regret to have you go, we know that our loss is others gain.

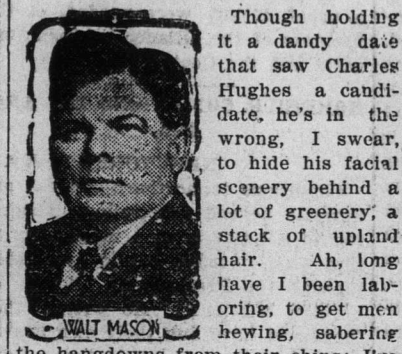

Canned Grayfish (Dogfish) on Market.

Samples of canned grayfish (dogfish), packed in Gloucester under the supervision of a representative of the Bureau of Fisheries by the Gorton Pew Fisheries Co., has reached New York. According to the legend on the tins, this new variety, which the bureau is seeking to introduce as a new fish food, has been packed under methods approved by the chemists who are in direct charge of the propaganda.

Canned grayfish is offered at 80 cents a dozen for 14 ounce tall cans. The appearance of the fish is no less inviting than other accepted varieties. To the acute taste it is somewhat different than most canned fish, the flavor being somewhat salty and strange.

The tins bear the following: "Grayfish has never before been utilized as a food fish because it was not adaptable to the methods of curing in general use. The developments of the canned fish industry has made it possible to place on the market in this deliciously flavored and highly nutritious fish at low cost."

Of course there is no demand in New York for canned grayfish at present, and it is the belief of operators that it will be some time before it is accepted by the New York trade. The flavor of the fish, however, it likely to recommend it to certain consumers who have heretofore used quantities of bonito, yellow fin and inferior grades of albacore or tuna. Factors in New York have evidenced some interest in the new variety of canned fish and many have taken occasion to sample it.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Aug. 26th.

Cut a paper pattern the size and shape of back and sides of carriage and make a cover to fit out of white pique or a natural colored linen. Bind with a wash braid and make buttonholes along the edge. On the upholstery of the carriage sew pearl buttons and button the cover on.

War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

ATTEMPT AT REBELLION IN BRITISH SOUTH AFRICA.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 10. Details of an attempt to foment another rebellion in South Africa were disclosed at a trial yesterday. Bloemfontein of two nationalists, V. Der Merwe and Schuken, on charges of high treason. The men are alleged to have approached a number of prominent Boers, including General Wet, to whom they told that stores of rifles were available, and that certain Boer Generals were ready to lead a revolt. General Wet, who informed the Government of the movement, testified that he was not men against attempting another rising. The hearing was adjourned.

BRITISH CAPTURE TRENT.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The British captured a German trench in Highwood, on the Western front, after sharp fighting, last night. It is announced officially to-day that man troops made several attacks during the night, but none of them were successful. The statement followed that night there was some sharp hand fighting in Highwood, where captured a German trench, taking officers and 19 Bavarians. In the operation heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy. There has been considerable hostile artillery, against our front north of Highwood and in the neighborhood of M. Farm. In this sector small infantry attacks were easily repulsed. A detachment of the enemy was tempted to advance from the position of Courcellette was stopped by our fire. Our troops carried out several successful enterprises in the neighborhood of Arras and the Zollern redoubt and north of Chapelle the enemy trenches entered. Some prisoners were taken and other casualties were inflicted.

FURTHER GAINS ON SOMME.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The British made further gains on the Somme front last night. The announced officially to-day, the statement follows: All ground gained yesterday has been maintained. Gains were further extended last night. This morning prisoners are still coming in. The full number cannot yet be stated. A large attack northeast of Pozières last night was easily beaten off. As a result of the heavy fighting during the past week our line has been advanced on a front of six thousand yards, depth varying from three hundred to three thousand yards. Several fierce and heavy losses have been inflicted on the enemy. The important and strongly defended locality of Falfemont farm, Guillemont and chry have been wrested from the spirit and dash of our troops in this severe fighting in the face of a constant and determined counter attack and constant intense artillery fire. The fine work of the Irish troops from Connemara, the Munster, already mentioned in connection with the capture of lemont, was carried on yesterday. The same troops in the attack of chry.
