

"Saint George For Merrie England."

A Red-Letter Day in Calendar of Newfoundland.

Monster Parade of Fraternal Organizations Commemorate Festival of England's Patron Saint—Thousands Attend Service in Anglican Cathedral—Biggest Procession Ever Seen in St. John's.

IMPRESSIVE SERVICE AT CATHEDRAL.

The route of march was down Theatre Hill, up New Gower Street, over Hutchings Street, and down Water Street, up McBride's and Church Hills to the Western Door of the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist, where the Warden and Select Vestry were in attendance, and soon the spacious edifice was filled to capacity. Thousands were unable to gain admittance and waited outside the doors, determined not to lose the greatest sight of the year. After all had been seated, Organist F. J. King gave a fifteen minutes recital, and punctually at 11 o'clock the Processional Hymn was given out, the opening words of the first verse, being "For all the Saints who from their labors rest," 437 A. & M., to the singing of which the Choir and Clergy, entering from the crypt, perambulated the South and Central aisles to the Stalls in the Chancel, in which also the C.L.B. Band and Battalion had seats. The clergy in attendance were:—Canon Jeeves and Rev. J. Brinton, (Cathedral) Canon Field, (St. Michael's), Revs. A. B. S. Stirling, (St. Mary's), A. Clayton, C. A. Moulton, (St. Thomas's), Dr. Facey, (Queen's College), Rev. H. L. Pike, (Bishop Field), Rev. G. Elliott, (Tack's Beach, P.B.). A special form of Service had been prepared, the order of which was taken by Rev. J. Brinton, opening with the lesson from the Book of the Prophet Malachi, Chap. VI, verses 1-10, and was read by the Rev. Canon Jeeves. Next came Psalm XCIII, "Cantate Domino," followed by the intercession, of the Apostles' Creed and prayers for His Majesty the King and Royal Family; For Workmen and Employers of Labor; For those at Sea; For those who gave themselves in the Day of Battle, and the Doxology. Instead of an Anthem the C.L.B. Band rendered a selection, "Land of Hope and Glory," in that most perfect style for which this Band is noted.

SOCIETIES FORM UP.

Punctually at the time appointed the various Societies, taking part in the parade, left their respective Halls and fell into line, each headed by a band. The objective was Garrison Square, at which place the giant procession was to be marshalled. Thousands of citizens thronged the sidewalks, terraces, steps of public buildings and other points of vantage, and windows and even roofs were occupied by numbers desiring to obtain an uninterrupted view of the different organizations as they marched to the appointed place. All roads led to Garrison Square on Saturday, and as the vast bodies of men, marching two deep, converged on that point of junction, spectators massed themselves in solid phalanxes around the parade, enclosing them within a human square, thus proving the patriotism of the multitude, and approving the purpose of the demonstration. Marshals were not long in forming ranks, and headed by the Flag of the Newfoundland British Society, a huge gilt Union Jack, over 50 years in service, drawn by a pair of horses owned and driven by Mr. Thomas Volney, and guarded by three of the oldest members of that Society, the Societies swung into line, four abreast, in the following order of seniority:—

THE SERMON.

Before beginning his sermon, the Rector welcomed the Societies to the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Newfoundland in a few well chosen words, and expressed the pleasure it gave him to see such a splendid body of men belonging to different organizations, yet working for the same object—patriotism and benevolence. The text was from the book of Deuteronomy, Chap. XXVI, verse 5, "And thou shalt speak and say before the Lord thy God, A Syrian ready to perish was my father, and he went down into Egypt, and sojourned there with a few, and became there a nation, great, mighty and populous." The application of the words quoted, to the subject under discussion, was very forcefully made by the preacher, who drew an analogy between he who went down into Egypt, and there founded a mighty nation, and the early English discoverers and colonisers, who sailed into

unknown seas in search of adventure and to discover other lands and make them part of the grand Empire which they had to-day. After the sermon, which was listened to with rapt attention by the auditors, Hymn No. 142, A. & M., was sung, and the Offertory taken. One half of this is to be devoted to the Cathedral Spire and Tower Fund. The NATIONAL ANTHEM accompanied by the C.L.B. Band was next sung, and the Blessing pronounced by the Rector. For the Recessional, that thrilling and inspiring hymn of Rev. S. Baring-Gould's, "to the familiar strain of the music of Sir Arthur Sullivan, "Onward Christian Soldiers" was selected, and it was a revelation to learn how much strength and volume could be put into the singing, when every person in the congregation knew both words and music, without the book, and poured all the music in their souls in this hymnological declaration of their Faith.

RECEIVED BY THE GOVERNOR.

His Excellency the Governor, accompanied by Miss Harris and Capt. Salimarshe, A.D.C., attended the service, the representatives of the Societies having seats reserved for them in the nave. The Governor was first to depart, the congregation standing as he passed out. Next the Societies, which reformed ranks outside, proceeding down Gower Street and by way of Cavendish Square, to Government House, entering the grounds by the Eastern gate, and forming up in front of the main entrance, where Mr. Geo. B. Lloyd extended greetings to His Excellency on behalf of the Societies, to which Sir Charles made suitable and appropriate reply. Cheers being given for His Majesty the King, Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales, the Governor of Newfoundland and the Prime Minister who was in the ranks of the Loyal Orange Association as P.P.G.M., the procession moved out by the Western gate, continuing along Military and Queens Roads to the starting point of the parade, where after inter-fraternal felicitations had been exchanged, each organization, headed by its band filed out of the general parade in regular order and returned to their Halls, thus bringing to a close one of the grandest—if not the greatest—demonstrations ever organized and witnessed in the annals of the population of St. John's.

PHOTOGRAPHED AS SOUVENIR.

The parade was most spectacular, the variegated colors of the different regalia of the Societies participating, being most perfectly blended, and with the sunlight flashing upon the gold and silver embroidery and jewels of the officers, an effulgence of brilliance radiated along the whole line of march, to the intense delight and pleasure of the numerous spectators, not one of whom fell out of positions taken up, until the last parade had departed from Church Square, and even the Lodges as they marched back to their Halls were followed by an immense number of admirers all anxious to see the last of the proceedings. At Government House a photograph was taken of the members of the Parade Committee in a group, whilst on their return to their Hall on Water Street, the Society of United Fishermen took up a position on Post Office Steps, Mr. J. C. Parsons turning the lens of his camera on them, and obtaining, so we learn, some capital pictures.

The Passing of a Venerable Cleric.

DEATH OF REV. CANON W. R. SMITH.

On Sunday morning, after a protracted illness, the venerable Canon Smith, Episcopal Commissary, entered into his eternal reward. For over half a century the deceased clergyman was prominent in all affairs that pertained to the good of this Colony. As a contributor to local history he was ever foremost and he was one of the Charter members of the Historical Society. Rev. Canon Smith was ordained Deacon of the Church of England by Bishop Field, in 1869, his years of service covering the short bishopric of Bishop Kelly and the long tenure of the sacred office by Bishop Jones, whose Commissary he was. Between the resignation of Bishop Jones and the consecration of Bishop White, Canon Smith acted as Administrator of the Diocese.

Canon Walter Redfern Smith was the son of the Rev. Benjamin Smith, Rural Dean of Trinity Bay, and Emily Moorhouse, his wife, both of York-shire, England. He was born at King's Cove, Bonaville Bay, on July 5th, 1845, educated at Trinity by the Rev. Mr. Crouch, his father's Curate; subsequently studying at Queen's College, St. John's. In 1869 he was made a Deacon by Bishop Field, and took charge of the Greenspond Mission. In 1871, Bishop Field ordained him Priest, and he was given charge of the Exploits and later of the Tilt Cove Mission. For some time he was a Curate with his father at Trinity East. In 1886 transfer was made to the Portuguese Cove Mission, where he remained for 25 years until his resignation in 1914. The Rev. W. R. Smith has been Rural Dean of Avalon, Canon of the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist, Episcopal Commissary, Administrator of the Diocese, a member of the Synod from its inception, and of the Synod Executive for 27 years. He was married on July 4th, 1871, to Mary, daughter of the late Geo. H. LeMessurier, Chief Clerk at the G.P.O., who predeceased him. Four children survive, Warwick, Statistical Clerk at the Department of Marine and Fisheries; Edward A., Manager of the Times newspaper; Ethel LeMessurier, who resided with her father, and Mary Kate (Mrs. W. F. Price), of Sydney, N.S.

The funeral service will take place at the Cathedral on Tuesday morning. Interment will be by the side of his beloved wife at Portuguese Cove.

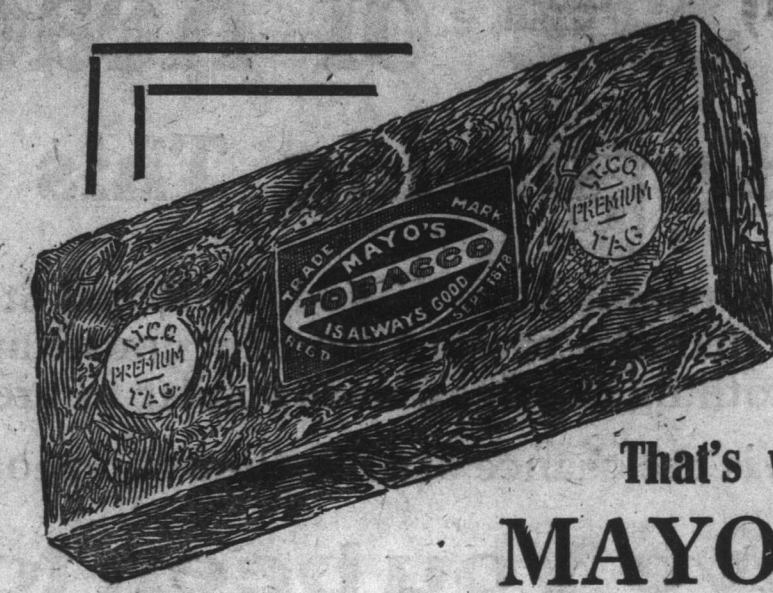

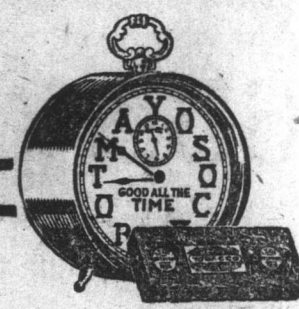
