The Montreal Beauty Powder Tragedy.

BELIEVED BY SOME THAT JAMES
BUCHANAN, WHO COMMITTED
SUICIDE, INTENDED THE POI-
SON FOR HIS WIFE.

Toronto, Jan. 30.—What caused the
father of the "beauty powder" victim
to committed suicide has brought out
two theories. His solicitor, John Hen-
nings, expressed the belief that James
Buchanan, was innocent of the murder
of his son, but had been hounded
into ending his own life by the mental
anguish he endured because from the
first he knew that a measure of sus-
picion rested upon him.

The other view is that Mr. Buchan-
an had planned the death of his wife
from whom he was living apart and
had sent the "beauty powder" with
the intention that the wife would take
it. She did not do so, but instead the
son, a promising college student took
it as a joke and died almost immedi-
ately.

There will be no formal inquest in-
to the death of James Buchanan. Chief
Coroner Graham decided that any
evidence necessary can be brought out
at the adjourned inquest which will
be held to-night into the death of the
son, Anderson Buchanan, the "beauty
powder" victim.

The news that James Buchanan had
suicided, just at the time when the
people of this city were eagerly await-
ing any information as to the success
of the search to find a clue that would
help unravel the mystery of who sent
the fatal powder to the home where
Anderson and his mother were living,
caused unusual excitement here Sat-
urday. On the day before the case had
taken a new turn when the announce-
ment came from Hamilton that a
printer there had printed an order of
beauty powder circulars and at once
arrangements were made to bring
Claude W. McCarthy, an employee of
the printing firm to Toronto to en-
deavor to identify the man who had
given the order.

Saturday forenoon detectives went
to James Buchanan's home to arrange
that he meet McCarthy, but discover-
ed the house locked and on forcing
an entrance, found him dead in the
kitchen, the house filled with gas
flowing from five gas burners of the
stove, an empty whiskey bottle on the
table and a book of Mark Twain lying
nearby. Mr. McCarthy then was taken
to view the body but while he
could not identify it as the man who
had ordered the circulars, the face be-
ing discolored by the gas, he at once
identified a photograph of the father
as the man.

More Than Three Weeks Elapsed

BEFORE THE WORLD KNEW OF
SHACKLETON'S DEATH.

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 30.—More
than three weeks elapsed between the
death of Sir Ernest Shackleton, the
British explorer, and its announce-
ment to the world, made yesterday
when the body arrived at Montevideo.
The delay, La Nación's Montevideo
correspondent telegraphs, was accus-
ed by Captain L. Hussey, who accom-
panied the body, as due to a series of
wireless mishaps.

Sir Ernest died aboard the steam-
ship Quest, on which he was making
another Antarctic voyage, which an-
chored off South Georgia Island on
January 5. His body was taken to
Montevideo on the first leg of the trip
home aboard the Norwegian steamer
Professor Cruvel.

Captain Hussey bore a death cer-
tificate made out at South Georgia Is-
land, reading:
"I, Alexander Macklin, certify to my
best knowledge and belief, that the
cause of death was atheroma in the
arteries of the heart. Before death he
had not suffered an infectious or
contagious disease."

The certificate was signed by Dr.
Macklin, a surgeon of the expedition.
The body arrived at Montevideo in a
hermetically sealed zinc shell, cov-
ered with wood.

Captain Hussey told La Nación's cor-
respondent that the Quest arrived at
South Georgia Island with her main
wireless plant out of commission due
to heavy storms during the voyage,
which was otherwise uneventful. Sir
Ernest had been in the best of health
throughout the trip. The day before
his death he landed on the island to
superintend the purchase of provisions
and returned to the ship apparently
well. After supper he went to the
cabin and conversed with his com-
panions.

At 3.30 o'clock on the morning of
January 5, he felt sharp pains in his
back and called the doctor, who had
hardly begun preparing remedies
when the explorer died without utter-
ing a word. When asked why the
Quest did not inform the Falkland Is-
lands with her minor wireless set,
Captain Hussey said it was not sum-
ciently powerful. The wireless equip-
ment also was out of order, he declar-
ed.

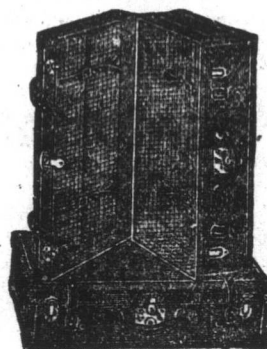

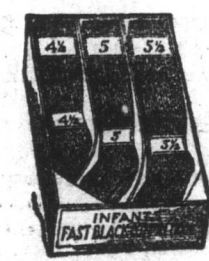

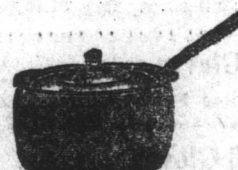
