MARION MURRAY, WELL KNOWN
IN PLACENTIA RAY, PASSES
AWAY.

Marion Murray, loved, honored and decorated by practically every Society attached to St. Francis Xavier's Church, Bar Haven, died on Tuesday evening, Dec. 11, at 3.30 p.m., after a brief illness. Mrs. Murray was 39 years of age, was an international figure and woman of mercy. Her many accomplishments won her great fame, and news of her death came as a great shock here. She was the mother of Willie Murray, one of Father Cacciol's dear little altar boys. His little sister Mary, joined him in prayer at his mother's bedside and received the tender blessing at their good Pastor on their little brow: the parting good-bye from their dear and fond mother, just before she passed away. Sorrowfully we record the death of Mrs. Murray who was called to her eternal reward during the week. The great High Priest did not allot her a plethora of years in his service in this life for he summoned her in the very prime of life. She is sincerely mourned by her dear husband and loving children. Her death is lamented by the community in which she lived, and all those around who knew her and loved her. Her funeral took place on Wednesday morning at 10.30 a.m., thence to St. Francis Xavier's Church, Bar Haven, at 11 o'clock, where a solemn High Requiem Mass was sung for the repose of her soul. Rev. Fr. Cacciol, who pronounced the Absolution and preached the Eulogy. Little Willie Murray's Altar Boy companions were the pall bearers. The interment took place at Calvary Cemetery, where beautiful hymns were sung to treasure in fond memory the happy hours her gifted voice sounded the praises of God when she was a member of the church choir.

IMPORT TO LIVE.

Westminster Gazette: While export trade counts for little in the prosperity of the United States, for us it is a first essential. Without exports we could not buy that two-thirds of our food that we cannot grow for ourselves. Equally we could not buy the raw materials without which our industry could not be carried on. We import to live, and to import we must export.

Daily Express: Do our publishers read all the books they publish? Do their readers read every page of every book they advise the publishers to publish? Do the libraries maintain any system of supervision? Or is there in some cases a failure of scrutiny and vigilance on the part of all three? We ask these questions because in some books lately issued there are passages which ought to have been deleted before publication.

If we once step outside our territorial waters we shall never get back. In the brief lexicon of Johnson and Child there is no other word than fall for the United States when it ventures abroad. On the score of intelligence, we are warned that all of the American people can be fooled all of the time by any foreigner that comes along. On the score of will and courage we are warned that we have none. We move. We are entangled. We are done for.

MOTORING.

The Times: Nothing can alter the fact that motoring, apart from its usefulness from a commercial point of view, is becoming more and more a necessary adjunct to the everyday life of a large section of the public. Not only the prices of all cars, especially of the cheaper class, but the whole cost of upkeep and running expenses, have been so greatly reduced that what used to be the rich man's luxury has been brought within the reach of people of quite moderate means. Now that it is possible to buy a sound four-seater car of British make for under £400, and smaller cars at proportionately lower rates, there is a welcome expansion in the volume of sales, the amount of capital invested in the industry, and the number of workers to whom it gives employment.
