

#### Thinks Nutting is in Labrador

MAN WHO TRIED TO CROSS OCEAN IN SMALL BOAT MAY BE ALIVE.

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 20 .- (Canadian Press)-William Washburn Nutting, the New York journalist, who attempted to sail from Norway to New York in a small boat and has not been heard of for several months, may still be alive, according to a letter received to-day by the Halifax Echo from Rufus W. Sweet of Goldenville, Guysborough ounty, Nova Scotia, who has just returned from Greenland where he left Mr. Nutting and pagty on September 6 or 7.

Mr. Sweet, who is well posted on Greenland, believes there is still a good chance that Mr. Nutting and party are alive. They may, he writes. have been picked up by some whaling crew or landed on some remote part of Labrador. In either case they would be beyond the reach of wireless and have to wait considerable time before getting in touch with the outer world. Nutting and Sweet spent two days together at Julianehaab. Greenland. early in September. In parting Nutting told Sweet he intended to strike for the northern part of Labrador and have a look at the natives on his way south and to reach Nova Scotia by the first of October.

Mr. Sweet said Nutting's boat was well built and he did not consider there was much chance of his party eing on the Greenland coast.
