## CHAMPIONS CLASH WITH TERRA NOVAS.

## Goal Scored in Last Half Minute.

The Terras got going as Referee John dropped the puck sharp on time and came down towards Hunt, the Terras goalkeeper, with a rush. Two shots were saved in rapid succession before Hubert Rendell managed to break clear with a swoop which took him the full length of the ice. Back came the Terra Novas and Canning and Field again gave something to think about. Ewing took a run and when in line with the goal passed to Lloyd who missed great chance. The trick was repeated a moment later with the same result. Great attempts were made by both sides to combine but the ice surface made speed impossible and prevented the puck from sliding freely. Gillies, Peters and Field pulled off several fine runs together and saved the Feildians defence considerably. Before Field drew first blood with a high shot which glided off Hunt's goal into the net. The cheers of the crowd nearly lifted the roof. Heartened by their success the Terra Novas pressed the Feildians harder than ever, and were rewarded a few minutes later when, a mix-up having taken place, "Nix" out of his goal, Canning simply made the most of the opportunity. For the balance of time the pace was hot, but the Feildians, with two goals against them, put out every effort to keep it at that, and succeeded in spite of a rain of shots.

## 1st Period.

The rough spots by this time had been cut down somewhat and better play was possible. Rendell was not getting away on one of his famous runs but failed to make the objective. Bayly also tried his luck without success, owing to the strong defence of Peters and Gillies. Clearly the Feildians had recovered from their shock and during the second period were far more aggressive than they had been in the first. Their combination at times was fine but in the goal they were erratic. Three minutes of a rain of shots at Field, the Terra Novas' goalkeeper, who saved splendidly, resulted at last in Ewing sending him one too many and Hubert's No. 1 for his side. The Feildians made several changes in their defence, and F. Rendell and Alderice taking the places of Ewing and Reid. These, Alderice particularly showed up well and the others gave a good account of themselves. No further scoring took place before the gong rang.

## 2nd Period.

The Terras started in with a hustle and the Feildian goal, but the defence held up the attack and it was not evident that the champions were out to win. Peters and Gillies were hard put to it to keep them out, and the crowd were given a fine display of hockey and excitement ran high. Fifteen minutes passed before scoring, securing the puck from a trap in front of the Terras' goal, and a quick shot to Field who, unable to see what was happening because of those in front, was unable to stop the puck and the Feildians had evened up the score. Then the rink went mad and the teams responded to the yells of their supporters with every pound of muscle they possessed. Both goalkeepers were called on again and again but it was not until a friction of a minute before full time that Lloyd, making a neat run up the ice, passed Jimmy Alderice, who promptly slipped it in the net. The gong rang before the puck could again be centred.

## 3rd Period.

There is no mistaking the fact that the four teams in the League are more evenly matched than ever before and hard fight is certain right to the end. Speed was hampered by bad ice, but the game could never be called slow or a minute.

The Terras' combination, if anything, was better than that of the Feildians, but was upset every now and then through off-side play by Field, who otherwise gave a great account of himself.

Alderice seemed to put new life into the Feildians as soon as he appeared on the ice. Reid, for the Feildians, played a hard game, but his skates too often came in unnecessary contact with the puck. The defence of both teams was admirable and Mix Hunt and G. Field, in the goals, were great value to their respective sides. It was not a night for spectacular runs, but the veterans Rendell, Canning and Ewing gave several good exhibitions of speed and stick handling, which showed that they had lost none of their old time vigor. Peters, both in defence and attack, was in great form.

There were but two minor penalties handed out by Referee Tobin. The whole game was a hard, fast, clean fight from start to finish.

## ENGLAND AGAIN FAILS TO RETRIEVE THE ASHES.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 8.—(Canadian Press Cable, via Reuters).—England's hopes of ending Australia's sequence of victories in cricket test matches played in the Commonwealth during the past twelve years were rudely dashed yesterday when 45 minutes' play sufficed for the dismissal of the remaining touring players in the closing innings, leaving the Antipodeans winners by 81 runs.

Australia scored 600 and 250, England replying with 479 and 290. The home players have now won the first two tests of the season.

When play was resumed this morning England had scored 259 runs for six wickets, requiring 113 runs for victory. The score was carried to 289 when Douglas was retired and one run later Sutcliffe was caught by Gregory, his total being 127. This proved the

beginning of the end. Gilligan and Tate being dismissed with the first balls delivered. Chapman was not out with four to his credit when the innings closed for 290 runs.

Sutcliffe was accorded a wonderful ovation on the attainment of his two centuries in one test match, and his third consecutive hundred in the present series. At the conclusion of the innings the crowd rushed on the ground shaking the Yorkshire player by the hand, patting him on the back and cheering wildly. The other players were also heartily applauded for the great fight they had put up. Sutcliffe received showers of congratulatory cables from England, while in Australia a "shilling fund" has been started for his benefit.

Seven thousand spectators attended to see the closing phase of what Collins, the Australian captain, described as the greatest of all test matches. The weather was fine and warm and the wicket in good condition.

## A Social Evening

Canon Bolt, the President, was in the chair, and in a brief address explained that the object of the gathering was to increase interest in the Society and infuse enthusiasm in the collectors who are about to undertake the yearly collection of subscriptions, which it is hoped will be largely augmented. The Bible Society was worth while. It was one of the greatest missionary organizations, and if its work was stopped, missionary effort would stand still. The Society aimed to give the Bible to every man in his own tongue, and evangelize the world, and was worthy of the fullest support. There were many other demands, but none greater. The Canon hoped that a great number of subscribers would be forthcoming this year. He was pleased to be able to say that the special speaker of the evening, Rev. Mr. Godfrey, of St. Thomas, was one who could speak from personal experience of the value of the Bible in the great mission fields of the East.

Mr. Godfrey delivered a most interesting address. He had had experience with Bible Society depots in Africa, India and Mesopotamia, but he spoke particularly of missionary work on the North West frontier of India, which is peopled by fanatical Mohammedans, and where "every third man was a potential murderer." A large part of the missionary's work there was the distribution of the Bible, and he told of the experiences of a young lady of Scottish descent, whose influence had become so great that she was able to accomplish a rescue when a regiment of British troops failed. The circulation of the Bible, or printed portions thereof, was accomplishing great things amongst these people, it was indeed the chief factor in the spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Does the Bible, accomplish anything unaided? He answered the question by pointing to Nepal, which is still closed to missionaries, but which is being christianized through the private distribution of the Scriptures. He spoke of idol worship, and relating the story of Krishna, exhibited a miniature of that Hindu god, Mr. Godfrey's whole address emphasized the work that was being accomplished through the dissemination of the Bible, and he was one with Canon Bolt in urging support of the Bible Society.

The evening's proceedings had opened with a solo by Mr. Ruggles, and were entertained by Mrs. Small, Miss Langmead and Miss Mews, whose songs were greatly appreciated. Miss Tait and Mrs. W. F. Rendell did the accompanying. To the soloists for their music, to Mr. Godfrey for his splendid address, to the ladies who had prepared the refreshments, a vote of thanks was proposed by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland, seconded by Dr. Robinson and heartily endorsed by the assemblage. The remaining half hour was spent in pleasant intercourse, as the ladies passed around cups of tea and coffee and a generous assortment of cakes, sandwiches, etc. Meanwhile, the collectors were given their books, and arrangements were made to supply those who had been unable to attend.
