NEW YORK STOCKS ADVANCE TRADING IS HEAVIER

Harriman Issues Lead in Upward Movement; Trading Heavy

New York, May 22.—In a comprehensive upward move which lifted the important stocks 1 1/2 points, the market today broke away from the narrow groove which it has followed recently. There was no definite change in speculative conditions to which the firm in the market could be traced. Trading was heavier, and the ease with which prices were marked up suggested a scant supply of stocks.

It was assumed that shorting had been done, but that covering was primarily responsible for the report. Prices released from America's most important stocks apparently after the most pressing demand from the shorts had been met. The Harriman stocks led in the upward movement, being influenced by representative rumors that a plan had been agreed upon for the separation of the properties in accordance with the terms of the supreme court decision. The fact that a joint meeting was held of representatives of Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific boards, the firmness of Union Pacific recently, and its ready response previously to similar unconfirmed rumors, have strengthened the belief that satisfactory progress is being made in the negotiations.

Considerable importance was attached to the announcement that \$10,000,000 gold had been engaged for export to Venezuela. The engagement was believed to mark the beginning of the outflow of gold to South America, which occurs each year. In the opinion of international bankers, this year's movement was no larger than usual. It was pointed out that Europe is in no position to ship gold to South America, and its ready response previously to similar unconfirmed rumors, have strengthened the belief that satisfactory progress is being made in the negotiations.

London Market Sluggish. London, May 22.—Money and discount rates were easy today. The stock market opened weak and closed about the lowest, as the favorable bank statement failed to have a steadying effect.

New issues depressed gilt edged securities and labor fears and the opposition of traders to the proposed advance in freight rates depressed home talk, while the continent continued to offer stocks, especially mining shares, pretty freely.

American securities opened quiet and a fraction higher, but most of the list eased off under realizing before noon. Light New York buying hardened prices in the late trading and the market closed steady.

WINNIPEG WHEAT TRADING IS MORE ACTIVE

Opening Figures An Eighth in Advance for All Months; Cash Demand Slow

Winnipeg, May 22.—Trading on the wheat market in options was more active and prices were stronger on the higher, Liverpool cables and improved reports which it has followed recently. Opening figures were 1-8 higher for all months, and further advance of 1-4 to 3-8 occurred. During the last half hour of business the market sagged and there was a sharp break in the prices due to a spurt of liquidation and improved weather conditions. The close was 2-8 to 1-2 down from Wednesday's close, and 3-4 to 1-2 from the high point of the morning.

American markets were steady at the opening. Minneapolis showed a shade weaker later, on better weather conditions over the wheat areas, while Chicago was stronger for a time on an improved cash demand. Minneapolis opened unchanged to 3-8 higher and closed 1-4 to 3-8 lower. Chicago opened unchanged to 1-2 lower and closed unchanged to 3-8 lower.

The cash demand at Winnipeg for all grades of wheat was very slow, and offerings fairly heavy, while no new export business was done. Cash prices closed 1-2c up for No. 1-2c lower for No. 2, and lower grades unchanged.

Oats were stronger on an improved export demand while flax was steady. Cash oats closed 1-4 to 3-8 higher, for contract and 1-8 to 1-4 up on the options. Cash flax closed 1-2c lower and options 1-4 to 1-1-4 lower.

Receipts continue heavy. On Wednesday inspections were 214 cars and in sight Thursday were 500. Deliveries through the clearing house were: Wheat, 122,000; oats, 10,500 bushels; flax, 32,000 bushels.
