Farmers in this district are highly incensed over a "special" from St. Thomas to the Globe last Thursday, asserting that Elgin County farmers were laying in large supplies of hard cider to debase the residents of this county by selling it to "make small fortunes" for themselves. County Magistrate Hunt is given as authority for this libel on the hard worked farmers, who have striven so hard to conserve all farm products during the war, and when there was no sale for apples this season, with hundreds of bushels rotting on the ground, farmers made as many as possible into cider, and are storing it for vinegar. Since the apple crop for the past three years has been a failure cider vinegar has been at a premium. Squire Hunt asserts he has his information "from a reliable source." Will the gentleman kindly give his authority? A man who resides in Port Burwell was fined recently for selling hard cider, by Squire Hunt. This man never owned a farm in his life. He has two members in his family in prison for theft, and as Squire Hunt sent them there, he knows the record of the family,
