LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—A scarlet fever case has been reported from Alfred street.

—Mr. E. Armstrong, of this city, is visiting his parents in Brussels.

—Miss Wilbur Dorland, of Owen Sound, is visiting Mrs. F. Manning, of Queen's avenue.

—Misses T. Mitchell and M. Glover, of St. Thomas, are visiting Miss Della Edgecombe, this city.

—The vital statistics of the city for the month of February were: Births 43, deaths 30, and marriages 19.

—Mr. F. Luzzey, of this city, has gone

to Stratford, where he has secured employment in the Queen's Hotel.

—The Seventh Band of this city will contribute to Fisher Flannery's concert in the St. Thomas Opera House, March 9.

—The special services in connection with the Arkia Street Methodist Church will be continued until Tuesday evening. Conductor Snyder is expected to preach at the last service.

—Berlin has made a bid for the Thirtieth Battalion visit on May 24. The Hamilton men have not made up their minds yet whether they will favor London or Berlin with their presence.

—Mrs. William Lipsey, of St. Thomas, died on Friday at the advanced age of 72 years. She leaves a family of three sons and two daughters. Mr. W. A. Lipsey, of this city, manager of the Agricultural Savings and Loan Company, is one of the sons.

—The jury failed to agree in the case of Hampton vs. Lawson, which was tried before Judge Elliott. The circumstances of the case were that last August the defendant was riding a bicycle on the sidewalk along the Proof line, and Hampton attempted to put him off the sidewalk, but received a broken collar bone for his pains. The case will come up again on March 27.

MR. McMECHAN AND MR. YATES.

The Two Have It Out About the Trade Views of the Last-Named.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:—As you have taken the liberty of using my name in connection with Mr. McMechan, I trust that you will insert the following: I always took Mr. McMechan for a truthful man, and will do him the justice to think that he has misinterpreted what was said, as had hearing sometimes makes bad rehearsing.

Some months ago (not weeks) Mr. McMechan came to talk about other matters entirely foreign to the trade and fiscal policies of our country, but incidentally the question came up as to how we would be affected by Free Trade, which I stated that the only way in which we could compete with the Americans would be to take one or two articles that we manufacture and make a bonfire of the balance of our country's goods.

In regard to our works being a training school for boys who go to the other side to better themselves I might say that we have out a number of good mechanics, some of whom are getting good wages on the other side, but on the other hand we are never short of hands, for the reason that we pay about as good wages as they get over there, and don't ask our mechanics to work for a \$1.50 per day. I don't think that we have a lack of territory that compelled the Messrs. Watson (by whom Mr. McMechan was employed) to shut down, but rather think they had too much territory for the size of their capital. I don't wish to go into a newspaper controversy over this matter, but if compelled to I am prepared to go on with facts and figures. Yours truly,

Mr. McMechan's Rejoinder.

Mr. McMechan was seen by an ADVERTISER representative on Saturday afternoon, and shown the above letter. In reply, he says:

"I have to say in reply that, knowing Mr. Yates' politics, I took particular notice to what he said, and concluded he was a convert to the coming trade arrangements with the United States. You notice he does not deny that he sends his machinery to the States, but rather that the present duty, positively he said nothing about a bonfire of some of his patterns, but spoke of the advantage of making a few specimens for a large market instead of building a multitudinous assortment of stuff for a small one. Our talk was not months ago, but only a few weeks since, and I make no mistake. Besides, I can get Mr. Yates a business man in his own block that says he heard him talk in the same strain, and concluded he was one of the Tories that had 'dipped over.' Perhaps you just looked up the 'Metal Worker' yesterday and an ad. of the McClary milk can style."

Mr. Yates is mistaken when he says the Messrs. Watson, of Ayr, had to shut down for want of capital. The only temporary shutting down of their works, for I am glad to say they have started up again, was caused by the character of a very large amount of farmers' paper from being a first-class asset to one of long-winded unreliability, and why? Caused by the Commission for the purchase of machinery and a tariff wall in front of their natural market.

AN AXE-MAKER SPEAKS.

What He Thinks of the Policy of High Taxation and of Reciprocity.

Mr. Peter Bartram, the well-known Dundas manufacturer, in an address the other evening, said:

"Instead of promoting trade relations with our nearest neighbors, the Government says to try a foreign market. I am exhibiting at the Jamaica Exhibition, and am glad to say I have received several orders. But there I compete with the world, and pay duty on my raw material, which English and American manufacturers are free from. If I can compete with the duty, at a close profit, how much more could I control the market, having no duty to pay. (Applause.) To manufacture successfully our manufacturers should have capital, improved machinery, skilled mechanics and careful management. If a firm is doing a good business, in a large market, capital will flow to it. Money can buy improved machinery, and our mechanics are the best in the world. We have everything, then, but the market, and with a fair field Canadian manufacturers could more than hold their own."

"If the axe factory were running at its full capacity the duty on raw material would be \$6,000 per annum. If this duty were off it would give me profit enough of itself. With a larger market factories would have the advantage of running at a fuller capacity, as in proportion to the increased capacity with which goods can be turned out, so will the profits increase. Sir John's reciprocity scheme is jug-handled. He wants the United States to admit what we want to sell, and will not admit what they wish to send us in exchange, a state of affairs Uncle Sam would not tolerate for a moment. We are told if any arrangements [made with the States, that we must discriminate against Great Britain. What is the Government doing now? There is a heavy duty on iron for the express purpose of keeping out the English article. They claimed this duty would develop the Canadian mines. It has not done so, and the only development has been a large increase in the importation of scrap iron. To-day all manufacturers have to pay additional duty, which greatly increases the cost of their raw material. Massey, of Toronto, has to pay duty on his iron, and takes his machines to England, there to compete with English manufacturers, who pay no duty. It has been said by Conservatives that revenue is mostly derived from luxuries, such as wines, silks, etc., and that the poor man thus escapes the greater proportion of taxation. Facts do not bear out this contention. In 1899 cottons were taxed \$1,198,425; coal, \$763,902; earthenware, \$238,055; iron, \$2,946,120; provisions, \$471,476; sugar and molasses, \$3,816,297; wool, \$2,963,707, or a grand total of \$12,388,052, more than one-half of the whole revenue."

Mr. McKechnie—How about tea and coffee?

Mr. Bartram—The poor people cannot live on tea and coffee. My friend hangs his whole case upon tea and coffee. But men cannot live on tea, coffee and water."
