Fed the Baby Pins.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—At Walsham, in Norfolk yesterday, a nurse girl was charged with administering pins to the 7-month-old child of Robert Barham. For some time it was noticed that the child was suffering intense pain, and all the efforts of a physician to relieve it were useless. No one could tell what the matter was until pins were noticed in the child's excreta. Then the nurse girl was accused of forcing the baby to swallow them. She at first denied it, claiming that the baby itself had swallowed them. She finally broke down, however, and acknowledged that she had stuffed a number of pins into the mouth of the little one as it was lying in its cradle. The baby is in a critical condition.

THEY JUDILATE!
Mr. Mercier's Friends Turn Out En Masse.

Immense Demonstrations in Quebec and Montreal.

QUEBEC, Nov. 6.—At the demonstration in favor of Mr. Mercier last night there was a great crowd of people in the line of march. Mr. Mercier's carriage was drawn by four horses, and he was accompanied by his lawyers, Messrs. Lemieux, Tremblay and Mr. Tarte, of the Canadian. There was also a music corps, Bengal lights and rockets were used liberally in the line of march. At Jacques Cartier Square fully 10,000 people were assembled and the ex-Mr. P. Mercier was loudly applauded. He was severe on his persecutors, but he was glad the people had taken his case in their hands and saved him from his tyrants. He concluded by saying that he would have revenge in Parliament where he had still a seat. Messrs. Tarte, R. Lemieux and other gentlemen also addressed the immense crowd.

THE PEPE'S HEALTH.
ROME, Nov. 7.—The representative of the Associated Press, determined to set at rest the rumors concerning the health of the Pope, called at the Vatican and obtained an audience with his Holiness. He found the Pope in excellent health.

SCOTCH HOME RULE.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—A deputation from the Scottish Home Rule Club waited upon Sir George O. Trevelyan, secretary for Scotland, and claimed that the question of Scottish Home Rule should have attention simultaneously or directly after Irish Home Rule.

KILLED BY CRITICISM.
PARIS, Nov. 6.—Florimond Ronger-Huve, the well-known dramatic artist and French composer, died Friday night. It is said his death was caused by passion aroused while reading an unfavorable criticism on his last work. His anger brought on an attack of asthma which killed him.

CREAM'S CASE.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—Mr. Asquith, the Home Secretary, granted a respite of a week to the murderer Neill-Cream, who was to have been executed on Tuesday, chiefly on the affidavit of an American, Rev. Dr. Matthews, who is acquainted with Neill's family. In his affidavit the minister declares he believes Neill and other members of the prisoner's family are insane.

DIGNA DISAPPOINTED.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—A dispatch from Suakin on the Red Sea coast of Egypt says that Osman Digna, the Sudan chieftain, has failed to induce the different tribes to join him in his proposed revolt against the Egyptian Government, and that he has retired to Admet, where he is collecting his own force.

MUST BELIEVE IN IMMERSION.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—The officers of the Talmadge have issued a circular letter to the members, declaring that it is imperative that the pastor chosen to succeed the late Rev. Dr. Spurgeon shall be a firm believer in the doctrine of immersion. This letter is interpreted to mean the end of the Rev. Dr. Arthur T. Penson's chances of being chosen to fill the pulpit.

SOMEbody BLUNDERED.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Admiralty has ordered that the officers of the stranded battleship Howe be tried by court-martial for running their vessel aground. The Admiralty papers demand a searching inquiry into the affair. Spanish naval officers consider that the stranding of the Howe was due to negligence on the part of the crew in command. They admit that the vessel was in a state of disrepair, but they claim that the Howe entered safely. They say the Howe had only to follow in the tracks of her leaders and she would not have gone on the rocks. The reports that the Howe had sunk were incorrect.

THE FINANCIAL PULSE.
LONDON, Nov. 6.—Discount closed yesterday at 2 1/2 for three months, and 1 1/2 for six. In the middle of the past week the rate in the open market advanced to 3 1/2. The Bank of England would raise its rate to at least 3 1/2, but when the London market advanced an advance was announced, and the Bank of England was obliged to raise its rate. On the Stock Exchange during the week business was quiet, and the market was in a state of uncertainty.

ITALIAN ELECTIONS.
ROME, Nov. 7.—The general elections for members of the Italian Parliament were held yesterday. Most of the members of the present Government were re-elected.

THE CHOLERA.
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 7.—In St. Petersburg, cholera has been raging for 24 hours ending yesterday with seven new cases and one death at St. Isaac's. There were 15 new cases and four deaths during the same time.

The Salvation Army paraded the streets of Brussels on All Saints' Day, and were pelted with mud and missiles by the populace. The Salvationists are meeting with little success. They are making but few converts, and their meetings are sparsely attended.

FAVORITE DEAD AND BODY.
A dispatch from Vienna states that since Halloween the Empress has become even more melancholy than she has been at any time since the death of her son, the Crown Prince Rudolf. Her days are divided between prayer and the contemplation of the misfortune of the unfortunate Prince. Her Majesty can hardly be prevailed upon to partake of food. She rarely utters a word, and gives indications of failing mind and body.

Louis J. Jennings, formerly editor of the New York Times, and since 1885 member of Parliament for Stockport, is seriously ill.

THE RICHILDS AND THE RUSSIAN LOAN.
There has been considerable speculation about the refusal of the Rothschilds to loan the Russian Government. One report has it that the Rothschilds demanded an assurance, which was refused, that Russia contemplated no military measures in the east of Europe in the immediate future. A more probable reason is that the Rothschilds refused to have any relations with the Russian Government as long as the persecution of the Jews continues in the empire.

NELLIE GRANT'S MARITAL TROUBLE.
Mrs. Nellie Grant-Sartoris has returned to her residence at No. 69 Cadogan Place, the breach between herself and her husband being wider than ever; but, wide as it is, Mrs. Sartoris absolutely refuses to take any steps leading to a divorce, giving as her reason that the difference due to the memory of her illustrious father will not permit her to drag his honored name through the mire of a divorce court.

PRINCE GEORGE WILL MARRY MAY IN MAY.
It is solemnly announced, without the slightest pretense of a blush at previous denials, that Prince George, the heir apparent, is to be married in May next. The Lord Mayor, Mr. Knill, considers himself a very fortunate gentleman indeed to be in office at that time, because he will promptly be a baronet, as was his predecessor of last year because the Emperor William consented to enter the city during his minority, and two sheriffs will be knighted.

Whether the marriage shall take place at Westminster or Windsor is not yet determined, but circumstances and the preference of the bride make Westminster the more probable.

BILLIE BILTON'S LUCK.
To offset the annual report of the enormous profits of the owners of the gambling franchise at Monte Carlo a budget of stories about big winnings by lucky players has been sent out this week. Some of them have already been proven false, and it is safe to discount them. The report that Belle Bilton, Countess of Clancarty, won \$7,500 the other day is most widely advertised, but it probably will not be investigated. The Countess is a well-known figure in the gambling world, and her success is not surprising.

DEED OF CHIVALRY ON THE STAGE.
A capital illustration of a thrilling occurrence at Soerakarta, one of the principal places in that island. Morel, the well-known prima donna, was singing on the stage before a brilliant audience, including the Dutch President and the Japanese Prince, whose palace is at Soerakarta.

The audience was highly enthusiastic, and the prima donna seemed to be at her best. One of the richest young Hollanders in Soerakarta had just sent a bouquet to the prima donna, who received it with a smile, and was bowing gracefully, when suddenly her whole appearance changed. Her face seemed to turn livid, and with a cry of agony she fell to the stage.

The audience rose in consternation and the members of the troupe rushed to the assistance of the stricken woman. When they attempted to remove her she seemed to suffer so much that it was thought best to wait awhile.

In a few minutes, notwithstanding prompt medical attention, the prima donna died in full view of the audience. The cause of death was found to be a sudden and violent attack of Asiatic cholera.

THE LORD MAYOR'S BANQUET.
