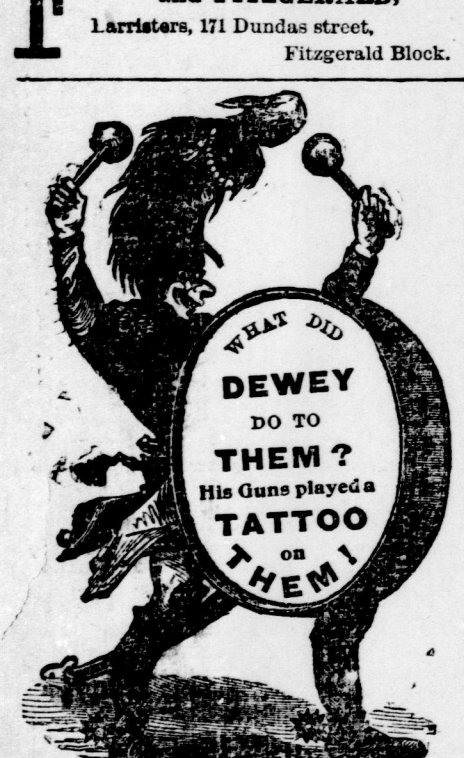

AMONG THE TENTS

Guelph's Council Entertained at Dinner by the Oxford Rifles.

Sergt. Smith of the Essex Battalion Reduced for Hazing and Causing the Fracture of Pte. Cheasley's Arm

Lieut.-Col. Maunsell, inspector of infantry, has begun his inspection of the several battalions for comparative efficiency, and to facilitate matters there will be no shooting at the ranges today. The 30th Wellington Rifles entertained a number of Guelph's representative men to dinner last evening. Among them were Mayor James Hewer, City Clerk Mitchell, Health Officer Capt. Clark, Ald. Newstead, Walker, Kennedy, Nelson, Stull and Baker; Mr. J. M. Duff, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce and Charles I. Nelles. Lieut.-Col. White proposed the toast of the Guelph City Council, in reply to which Mayor Hewer and the aldermen made pleasant speeches, in which they spoke highly of the battalion and its commanding officers. Lieut.-Col. Hegler, of the Oxford Rifles, gave a mess dinner to the commanding officers and staff last night. It was a huge success.

REDUCED FOR HAZING.

The recent hazing at Wolseley Barracks by the sergeants and non-coms of the 21st Essex Fusiliers has resulted disastrously for Sergt. William Smith. While in camp here in company with about a dozen other practical jokers, he, for several nights, had great fun arresting boys from the other battalions in the dead of night, and giving them mock trials at the quarters in the barracks. The victim was led in under guard onto a blanket which was pulled suddenly from under him. This worked admirably until Pte. Cheasley, of the 26th Battalion, broke his arm in the fall. All would have gone well with the jokers had not word of the accident been carried to the ears of Col. Guillot. A court of inquiry was held, and Smith, a ring-leader, was made an example of and reduced to the ranks for his share in the night's work.

WATER SUPPLY

Special Meeting of the Water Commissioners—Bylaw No. 81 Passed.

A special meeting of the water commissioners was held yesterday afternoon, with Chairman Jones, Commissioner Little, Secretary Ellwood and Superintendent Moore in attendance. The meeting was called for the third reading of bylaw 81, re the regulation of the water supply. This was passed. Mr. Rhoades, of Albion street, West London, was before the commissioners asking that a main be laid on the above street. He will get names of residents on the street who want water, and report to Chairman Jones.

The superintendent made the following recommendations: 1. That the laying of a main on John street be deferred until signed by sufficient property owners, agreeing to have water. 2. That a petition of John Fenn, for a main on Francis street, be granted, and that a three-quarter inch pipe be extended from the present main to supply his dwelling house. That a main be laid on Albion street if the residents would pay a percentage of the cost.

A number of rules governing water inspectors were adopted.

THE RAILWAYS

Track-Laying on the Montreal and Ottawa Road Completed.

The Grand Trunk officials expect to have work commenced on a new round house at Samia in a very short time.

The track laying on the Montreal and Ottawa Railway, the new C. P. R. short line, has been completed. All that remains to be done now is to make the connections with the Canada Atlantic Railway tracks and complete the ballasting. Two hundred and fifty cars of ballast are being deposited on the line every day. The bridge across the Rideau is completed. All the stations along the line are ready for occupancy. Regular trains will be running next month.

Listowel Standard: Listowel council is adding the movement to have the evening train on the London, Huron and Bruce division of the G. T. R., which now stops over night at Wingham, run through to Palmerston, returning in the morning. This would give the much needed accommodation asked for. As the trains are now run, it is impossible to go from Listowel to Atwood, Brantford, or any other point on the Kincardine or London, Huron and Bruce branches north of the Stratford and Goderich line and return the same day. As the change asked for would not entail any great additional expense, it is to be hoped that the G. T. R. Company will comply with it, and thus remedy a real grievance of the travelling public.
