## MIDDLESEX FARMS.

Some Interesting Statistics of Grains, Vegetables, Fruit, Dairy Products and Live Stock in the Banner County.

The following facts and figures regarding the agricultural wealth of Middlesex county are compiled from the last published reports of the Ontario Bureau of Statistics and Industry, and are for the year 1893. They may be of interest and value to many readers of the Advertiser. We do not know that they have been before published in this compiled form. Taxpayers and others interested in the county will do well to give them a careful study and to

preserve them for after reference and

. The total number of acres of occu-pied land in the county is 757,570, or something over three-quarters of a million. This is larger than any of the counties in the Province, with two or three exceptions, and these comprise large quantities of broken and untillable land. Huron and Bruce both contain more, but have a much larger proportion uncultivated. Of the total thus mentioned for Middlesex, 7,797 belongs to non-residents, and 749,773 to non-dents. There are 524,840 acres cleared, which is a larger amount than any other county in Ontario, except Huron, which reports 575,121 acres thus cleared. There are 217,512 acres of woodland and 15,218 acres of swamp or marsh. Brant county contains a larger percentage of cleared land than any other in Ontario —82—and Oxford 75, while Middlesex

has a little over 69.
THE GRAIN PRODUCTS. The total number of acres in fall wheat in Middlesex is put down at 80,212, and the total product 572,156 bushels. This is a larger acreage and yield than any other count in Ontario. The average yield per at 8 was 19.6 bushels, which is a little above the average for the whole Previous but not as larger of the whole Province, but not as large as Oxford, which was 22 bushels, or Perth,

22.2, or Waterloo, 21.9.

There were 1,529 acres of spring wheat with a total yield of 17,736 bushels, being an average of 11.6 bushels to the acre. That was the average yield of the entire Province of that grain. The year was a poor one, however, as the average yield for the previous twelve years was

15.2 bushels. There has been a large falling off in parley-growing in the county within a few years, owing to the decreased demand and prices. There were 10,564 acres in barley during the year, the yield amounting to 216,562 bushels, being an average of 20.5 bushels to the acre. That was not quite up to the general provincial average, which was 21 bushels, nor was it up to the average of the previous twelve years in the county, which was over 26 bushels. Of oats there were 78,186 acres, yielding

2.337.761 bushels, or an average of 29.9

bushels to the acre. This, too, was less than the previous twelve years, which was 37.2 bushels. The total provincial average was over 30 bushels. Very little rye was sowed, as it is seldom raised except on poor and gra-velly land. There were 338 acres, yielding 5,002 bushels, or 14.8 per acre, against an annual average of 17.6 bushels during the previous ten years. Peas reported better. There were 12-258 acres, and a total yield of 236,579

bushels, being an average of 19.3 bushels per acre, which was a little over the previous ten years, and over that of the entire Province.
Of corn there were 14,235 acres planted, and the yield was 899,652 bushels in ear, being an average of 63.2 bushels per acre. This was larger than the Pro-vincial average. In Essex county the average yield was 76 bushels an acre, in Kent 73, in Elgin 71, in Oxford 58,

and in Huron and Bruce 60. Of buckwheat there were 839 acres and 18,122 bushels, being 21.6 to the acre. Of beans there were 1,007 acres, with a total yield of 12,285 bushels, being 12.2 to the acre. HAY AND VEGETABLES.

There were 103,176 acres of hay reported, with a total product of 213,574 tons, or a little over two tons to the acre. This was better than the total provincial average, or for the previous ten years.

There were 4,778 acres of potatoes, yielding 416,642 bushels, being 87 bushels to the acre. The previous twelve

years' average was 104 bushels, and the total provincial average 90.5 bushels. Mangel wurzels were raised to the extent of 1,590 acres, the yield being 554,-910 bushels, averaging 349 bushels to the acre. The average for the previous twelve years had been 434 bushels. Of carrots there were reported 546 acres, yielding 157,248 bushels, being 288 per acre, against 326 during the pre-

vious ten years. Turnips were raised to the extent of 2,912 acres, yielding 1,025,024 bushels, being an average of 352 bushels per acre. The total provincial average was 417 bushels.

PASTURAGE, FRUIT AND GARDEN The total number of acres thus enum-erated under crop of all kinds amount-ed to 316,630. The total number under pasture was 177,838, and under orchard and garden 10,263. In the matter of orchards and gardens Middlesex had a larger acreage than any other county 1- Ontario. Lincoln came next with 10,049 acres. Kent reported 9,065 acres, Oxford 8,113 acres.

HORSES, CATTLE, HOGS, ETC. A total of 32,342 horses of all kinds were reported, there being 16,374 working horses, 4,725 brood mares, 11,243 colts and unbroken horses. Of hogs there were of all kinds 42,437. The total number of cattle was 105,-617, which was larger than any other county in the Province, except Huron, which amounted to 109,399. Of the total head of cattle 33,867 were milch cows, 22 oxen, 28,166 store cattle over 2 years of age, and 43,562 young and

other cattle. There were 79,596 sheep in all, with 41,062 fleeces of wool clipped, aggregating 264,634 pounds of wool, being an average of 6 1-2 pounds per fleece, which was considerably above the provincial average.

Of turkeys there were 35,038; geese The following statistics regarding sales during the year may be of interest also: Horses sold, 2,295; horned cattle, 31,813; sheep, 28,016; hogs, 48,408; poultry, 107,731. 12,981, and other fowls, 309,272. CHEESE.

No record seems to have been gather-

ed regarding butter making, which is a

ed regarding butter making, which is a large industry in Middlesex; nor yet of home-made cheese. Regarding cheese factories the following figurs are given: There were 897 cheese factories in the whole Province making returns during the year, and 86,166,719 pounds of cheese made, the gross value of which was \$8,338,709, or in round figures eight and a half million dollars. #### FLOODED ACAIN.

British Columbia Badly Inundated Owing to the Heat.

Snow on the Mountains Melted-Settlers Desert Their Houses.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 15 .- The waters of the Fraser River are today higher by two feet than during the terrible floods of June. Hot weather (70 in the shade) during the last three days brought down the snow from the mountains, swelling an unusually high tide. Then the Chinook winds, whose peculiarity is to rush along the surface of the water, caugh the swollen river and backed the water down over all the dykes which withstood the floods of June. Lalu Island, where the greater portion of the cattle in the Province are roaming, is threatended with obliteration, while Sea

Island, and the cattle have been driven to high knolls. Ranches have been flooded out for the second time in six months. The Government is sending boats to rescue the cattle. Bridges hitherto untouched by floods have been swept away and roads destroyed. There is no communication between

Island is three feet beneath the water.

The water is coming over the dykes on Lalu

suburban towns and large cities. All the waters in British Columbia have gone beyond their bounds. In Vancouver cellars of wholesale houses have been flooded and great loss sustained for the first time in its history. On Vancouver Island, 100 miles away, the floods have done great damage on railroad lines.

To add to the general discomfort, snow in the mountains has seriously handicapped the Canadian Pacific road in handling large quantities of perishable freight now waiting for shipment.

Many settlers have deserted their houses or are living in the upper stories, as the water in many of the houses is three feet deep. Luckily the farmers removed their cattle and stock in time, but they will nevertheless suffer much loss for fencing and damage done to hay, beside injury to dwellings. The municipalities will be the heaviest sufferers on account of damage done to roads, dykes and bridges.
