Lull in Political Matters-Talk of Confederation-Relief for the


Falcon's Crew. ST. Johns, Nfld., Feb. 10 .- A lull in political matters is expected now in conequence of adjournment of the Legislature. The bye elections will occur about March 20. There will probably be no contest except in the Harbor Grace district. On the re-assembling of the Legislature resolutions especting confederation are likely to be introduced authorizing a delegation to be sent to Canada to discuss terms of union. On the return of the delegation, providing its mission has been successful the resolutions will be submitted to a plebiscite, and on the result of which vote future action will be taken. If favorable a confederation union will be brought about as speedily as possible, but if against, then a crown colony is the only apparent alternative.

The Falcon relief fund amounting to \$420

in cash, besides considerable clothing, all contributed in the United States, has been distributed among the relatives of thr Falcon's crew of 15. The families received from \$20 to \$40 each, according to their circumstances, besides large packages of clothing.

420 Degrees Below Zero. At the cold of 420 degrees below zero produced by Prot. Dewar the tensile strength of iron is doubled and it will stand a strain of 60 instead of 30 tons to the square inch. It is believed that the particles of iron and all other substances are in constant motion, which increases as they are heated until they liquely, and that the very low temperature increases their strength by retarding the motion of the particles and giving them a greater power of attraction for each other.

Seven People Cremated. ARDMORE, I. T., Feb. 10 .- Last Wednes day night, about eighteen miles scuth of the city, a house occupied by a farmer named Tucker caught fire, and owing to the blizzard which prevailed, it burned so quickly that Tucker, his wife and four children were cremated in the burning building. Later it was learned that suspicion of foul play existed. It was thought perhaps the family had been murdered and the house fired afterwards. The police yesterday arrested Tucker's son-in-law, between whom and Tucker bad

Her crew, consisting of twelve or fourteen men, were every one drowned. The vessel is in a

thousand pieces.

CRISIS COMING. Says the Knights of Labor Leader—It Will be a Peaceful Revolution.

Phuladelphia, Pa., Feb. 11.-"The crisis is surely coming," said General Master Workman of the Knights of Labor Sovereign yesterday at Labor Lyceum Hall in an address to members of the Cloth Cutters' Association. 'There will be a serious uprising in this country within twelve months. Every move on the chess board indicates it. Capitalistic tactics are forcing the issue, and organized labor will be the victor. It will be a peaceful revolution, accomplished without the aid of Winchesters and Gatling guns. After the fight is over the people will say, when they see a Knight of Labor who has been steadfast throughout the strife, 'There goes an American patriot.' We want you to enlist for the war to become an integral part of our grand organization, until there is gathered within our fold sufficient memhers and strength to say to the other fellow, 'Thus far you have gone, and by the eternal God you shall go no further.'"

An Old Man's Battle for Life in the Blinding Snow.

MINDEN, Ont., Feb. 10 .- A heavy blizzard has raged here for the past 36 hours. QUEBEC, Feb. 10 .- During Friday's blizard an old man named Bussiere, aged 70, a milkman, from Little River, was found almost frozen to death under his horse, near Lorette, six miles from this city. His horse was blinded by the blizzard and unable to proceed. The animal broke away from the sleigh, but had only proceeded a short distance when it became stuck hard and fast in a snow bank. Bussiere reached the horse and sheltered himself under it. When found the unfortunate old man was in an almost dying condition. He will

DUNKIRK, N. Y., Feb. 10.—Reports reached here of terrible suffering by the passengers and crews of two trains that were stalled on the Dunkirk, Alleghany Valley and Pittsburg Railway seven miles south of this city. Four trains were stalled on this road between here and Sinclairsville, a distance of fourteen miles, The western division of the Erie is in the same deplorable condition, and traffic between Dunkirk, Salmanca and the northern oilfield has been abandoned. The Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad is

blocked from Brockton to Corry. CONNELLSVILLE, Pa., Feb. 10.-A passenger train on the Somerset and Cambria branch of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has been snowed in for 24 hours at Milwood station. A carload of provisions was started to the starving passengers. Snow drifts on the mountains are from fifteen to twenty feet deep on the railroad tracks.

CARLISLE, Pa., Feb. 10.-The Cumberland Valley and Philadelphia and Reading passenger trains which have been stuck in the snov since Friday afternoon, are still in the drifts and are likely to remain Somenville, N. J., Feb. 10.—There are ten big engines stalled in the snow drifts

along the Jersey Central Railroad. Five

of these are on the side tracks between the

junction and Phillipsburg, and four are

snowbound on the branch. The snow has drifted fifteen feet high and the cold is intense. BRADFORD, Pa., Feb. 10.-The snow blockade on all of the five railroads entering this city continues. The Erie is com-pletely snowed in and trains on other roads are stalled at several points. The snow is drifted on the tracks to the depth of six feet, and is packed so hard that it is an impossibility for a locomotive to get

through it.

SIX PERISHED. Shipwrecked Sailors Drop One by One

Into the Pitiless Waves. FIRE ISLAND, Feb. 10 .- It is stated that six of the erew of the unknown schooner ashere of Lone Hill life-saving station have perished. Through a field glass some persons claimed to have seen the men in the rigging shortly after she struck, but one by one they fell into the sea from cold and exhaustion until only two remained. The vessel struck in the outer bay off Lone Hill life-saving station. The lifesaving crew made preparations for a rescue. Their life saving apparatus was brought to the beach and a life line shot over the wrecked vessel, but the unfortunate men composing her crew, who had sought refuge in the rigging, were unable to get to it. The life-savers then attempted to launch their boat, but the high sea and wind made it impossible for them to do so, and they were compelled to stand idly by and see the poor sailors perish, for an hour later the crew com-menced to drop from the rigging into the sea. Yesterday morning but two of their number remained. They were still alive, and cries of "For God's sake save us!" were heard coming from the unfortunate men, but the surf was so high that it was impossible to launch a boat. At dusk these men were still in the rigging. At 7 o'clock a wrecking tug arrived. She had to wait for high tide to reach the

wreck, The schooner before reported ashore at Point of Woods life saving station proved to be the Louis V. Place, Captain Squires, from Baltimore and New York. The life saving crew rescued two of the crew, which consisted of eight men. The two

men were badly frozen and had been in the rigging two days and a night. The other six men had been washed overboard and drowned or frozen to death in the rigging. The names of the saved are S. J. Nelson, of Denmark, and Wm. Stevens, of Rockland, Me. The lost are Capt. Squires, Engineer Allen and Cook Morrison; Oelson and Ward, sailors, and

another man, name unknown. THE REVENUE CRY.

"It cannot be done," cry Ministerialists. "Where is he going to get the revenue?"
That is always the way. When the liberators of British commerce took the field the same question was hurled at them. It was thought to be a poser. "Get revenue?" said W. J. Fox. "Do you suppose we can't do better than get it by 'clemming' the poor?" Mr. Laurier is not bound to produce his budget now, but he can fairly say -we shall say it for him-that it will not be difficult to improve on a system which levies \$4,000,000 a year on coal and iron to the injury of the multitudinous interests in whole or in part bottomed on them, and after sixteen years has nothing in the shape of a mineral development to show for it. His plan is to fight with nature instead of against nature, to let Ontario buy her material and Nova Scotia her food on the most advantageous terms instead of handicapping both by absurd restrictions, and to make good the loss of revenue by substi-tuting honest government for boodling, and levying the taxes necessary after that in such a manner as to give every industry fair play, with special privileges to none. -[Toronto Globe.
