Anglo-Canadian Trade on the Increase.

Probability of the Prince of Wales Visiting Canada.

The Ashanti Trouble-Paris Exposition to be Open on Sundays.

ANGLO-CANADIAN TRADE. London, April 10.-The trade returns for March show the following changes in Canadian imports: Increase-Cattle £15,000; wheat, £56,000; oats, £18,000; bacon, £20,000; hams, £1,000; cheese, £38,000; eggs, £1,000; lumber, £1,000 The decreases are: Flour, £2,000; peas, £8,000; corn, £14,000; butter, £8,000; fish, £1,000; pulp, £10,000; timber, £2,000.

The exports to Canada show very large increases in woolens, carpets, galvanized iron and tin sheets, seed oil and wearing apparel. There are good increases in the other principal lines.

THE GOLD COST TROUBLE. It appears that the Ashanti uprising was due to efforts by the British to obtain possession of the "gold stool of Ashanti," which King Prempeh was alleged to have concealed at the time of his submission to the British expedition, led by Sir Francis Scott. Two British constables have been danger ously wounded and one has been killed. A third is missing, and 21 other casual-ties are reported. Most of the native chiefs, however, declare themselves loyal, and refuse to join the Coomassie tribesmen. The governor expects to secure a peaceful settlement. He has sent for two additional companies of troops. MAY VISIT CANADA.

In London it is generally believed that the Prince of Wales will certainly visit Canada during the coming summer. The idea has been quickened by the success of the Queen's visit to Ireland.
