Toward Pekin

Chinese Forces Getting Away From Tien Tsin.

Brilliant Dash Made by an Anglo-American Force-Eight Large Modern Guns Captured Without Losing a Man-The Way to Pekin Declared To Be Open-Good Offices of the German and American Government Asked-British Take Little Stock in the

Conger Incident.

against a large force of Chinese at Tien Tsin was made this morning by detachment of American troops, assisted by some English Fusiliers, says a Che Foo special to the Journal and Advertiser, dated July 20. The object was to capture a battery of large calibre cannon which had been doing great damage. The Anglo-American troops charged a large fort across an open space and were exposed to a hot but poorly directed fire from the ene-

my. They dashed into the fort, and uated Niu Chwang, where the roads after engaging the Chinese in a sharp are now guarded by Japanese marines. after engaging the Chinese in a sharp hand-to-hand fight, put them to flight and remained masters of the fort. the Eight large modern guns were captured, together with carts and all the accessories. The battery was immediately turned upon the fleeing enemy, and under the well-directed fire he suffered heavy losses. The victory was won in an incredibly short time against an overwhelmingly superior force, and despite the charge under fire and the fight in the fort, neither the Americans nor the British lost a single man.

The Chinese army is now retreating toward Pekin. London, July 23, 4 a.m.-Sir Chih-Chen-Loh-Feng, the Chinese minister in London, took the unusual step yesterday of paying a Sunday call at the

result. Sir Halliday McArtney, secretary of the Chinese legation, admitted that communication had been practically reopened with Pekin, and that messages from Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister, and the other foreign envoys, might be expected almost im-mediately. He said he hoped the trouble would soon be over, since the Chinese government was doing its utmost to overcome the difficulties and to con-

trol the lawless element. LONDON NOT CONVINCED. Nevertheless, no one in England believes that the alleged dispatches and

edicts are anything but subterfuges to hide the real situation as long as possible, and to avert retribution by sowing discord among the powers. From Shanghai comes a report that the empress dowager and the court are going to Hsian Fu, in the Province of Shan Si, to which the large stores of rice are sent, and that when these arrangements are completed, the remaining viceroys will declare against

foreigners. CHINA TRYING TO GAIN TIME. According to the Che Foo correspondent of the Daily Mail, the fall of Tien Tsin has so dishartened the Chinese that they are seeking terms of peace. He says that several attempts have been made to send messages to Pekin, but so far without any known results, and adds that rumors are again current that the Russians are reaching Pekin from the north. It is impossible to confirm or deny these statements, but either one might explain China's efforts to gain time.

LI HUNG CHANG'S VISIT

to Shanghai seems to be a complete failure. Except the Chinese customs officials no one has visited him. Sheng, the taotal (chief magistrate), gave the consuls a cordial invitation to meet him at luncheon, but all declined. The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express pretends to have authority for the assertion that Great Britain will repudiate any credentials Li Hung Chang may bring from the empress-dowager, and adds: "Russia, however, is willing to make terms with Li Hung Chang, whose real mission is to sow dissension among the powers. The British, Gerand man American representatives were resolute against receiving him.' The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail declares that the Chinese officials are thoroughly frightened by the fall of Tien Tsin and desire to open negotiations. New York, July 23 .- A brilliant dash | rumors at hand this morning. One is that Prince Tuan has been abducted, and that the empress dowager is again supreme. Another is that the notorious Kang Yi, president of the board of war, has been appointed viceroy of Canton, The Tien Tsin correspondent of the Daily News says the allies have issued a proclamation announcing that they are not fighting China, but only the rebels who have been guilty of attacks upon foreigners.

It is reported that the Bogue forts are being rearmed by the Chinese with quick-firing Krupps and large stores of ammunition, and they are mounting guns and laying torpedoes at various advantageous points between Woo Sung and Woo Chang. The foreigners and Japanese traders have evac-All foreign women and children have been advised to leave the forts on Yang Tse Kiang. Slight skirmishes are reported from Manchuria between the Russians and Chinese. APPEAL TO PRESIDENT McKIN-

LEY. Washington, D. C., July 22.-President McKinley has received what purports to be a direct appeal from the Chinese Imperial Government to use his good offices to extricate that government from the difficult and dangerous position in which it has been placed as a result of the Boxer uprising and the ensuing hostile atti-tude of the great powers. Although the exact text of the appeal made by the Emperor of China to France has not been made known here, it is believsimilar in terms to that communica-

tion The United States Government, while not guaranteeing the truth of the advices from the Chinese Government, as to the safety of the foreign ministers, is willing to accept the statements temporarily, in the meantime remitting none of its efforts to get access to Mr. Conger through the use of military force if need be.

WAY OPEN TO PEKIN.

It is true that the latest advices from Taku indicate that whereas it was originally estimated by the foreign commanders that the expedition could not be started before Aug. 15, it is now regarded by them as possible to make a beginning about the first of August. But the military experts here feel that even now the way is open to Pekin, and that the march should begin with the force at present on the Pel Ho, leaving the powers to bring up reinforcements to reopen the base, should the first expedition be cut off. According to the latest official reports the country around Tien Tsin is clear of hostile Chinese.

SORRY! Paris, July 22. - The Berlin correspondent of the Temps says: It is aserted in Berlin that the Emperor of China has sent a telegram to Emperor William deploring the assassination of drive the foreigners into the sea is an Baron Von Ketteler by the rebels, and declaring the murderers are being actively sought and will be punished. He also expressed the hope that the relations of China with Germany would not suffer from this state of things.

SIR HOLLIDAY McCARTNEY'S STATEMENT.

London, July 23 .- Sir Holliday Mc-Cartney, counselor and English secretary to the Chinese legation in London, who was interviewed yesterday, admitted that the legation was in receipt of news which it was not yet able to disclose. He added: "You may take it that on July 18, the date of the Conger message, all the legations and Europeans in Pekin were safe. I cannot say why the other ministers are not able to communicate with their governments, but there is no reason why five miles from here, jumped from the

as Mr. Conger employed." In the absence of news from China the papers devote much space to a discussion of the pros and cons of the reliability of the Chinese assertion of the safety of the Pekin ministers. A similar discussion is being repeated in various forms at the different European legations. While these reitera-tions have been causing some revival of hope, there is too great a distrust of Chinese duplicity for any acceptance of their truth.

THE COLD SHOULDER. Shanghai, July 22.-Li Hung Chang,

who arrived here today on the steam-er An Ping, from Hong Kong, was coolly received. The native officials sent an escort of 300 armed troops, but the French consul objected to their passing through the French settlement, and they were withdrawn and Li Hung Chang landed under an escort of twelve French police. consuls have decided not to call upon Li Hung Chang officially.

NO CHINA-JAPAN ALLIANCE. Yokohama, July 22.-The Corean Government continues to send troops to the frontier, a colision with intruding Chinese having dready occurred. The newspapers express sympathy with the unfortunate Emperor China, but are unanimous and emphatic in declaring that an alliance between China and Japan is quite im-

Hung Chang has arrived at Shang-Toronto, July 22.—The announcement of the massacre of missionaries in the Province of Shan Si caused some apprehension as to the fate of Rev. A. R. Saunders, his wife and family, formerly of Toronto; Miss Smith, formerly of New Hamburg, and the other members of the China inland mission in Shan Si.
