The English and Irish Channels Stormswept.

Dr. Krause, on Trial for Treason, Reserves His Defense.

FIERCE GALES IN BRITAIN.

London, Dec. 12.—A fierce gale is sweeping the English and Irish Channels. Many vessels are seeking shelter, and the lifeboats are busy rescuing small craft.

THE NEW ROUTE TO IRELAND.

Another important step has been taken in developing the new route to Ireland authorized by parliament, which may at no distant date provide the quickest way for mails and passengers.

\$10,000,000 TO ELECTRIFY LONDON.

It is announced that the total cost of the Yerkes system of electrification of London for both systems is estimated at \$10,000,000, and two years will elapse before work on the district section, which is the shorter of the two, is completed.

MISS STONE STILL ALIVE.

Berlin, Dec. 12.—The Sofia correspondent of the Lokai Anzeiger telegraphs that Miss Ellen M. Stone, the captive American missionary, was recently seen alive at Koprivnik, near Dubnitza.

SUGAR BOUNTIES.

Brussels, Dec. 12.—At a meeting of sugar manufacturers held here in anticipation of the forthcoming international conference, it was decided to oppose any international convention which does not entirely abolish direct and indirect bounties on sugar.

TO HARRY THE MAHSDS.

London, Dec. 12.—A dispatch from Calcutta says the military position on the Waziristan frontier is such that six native battalions and one mounted infantry brigade are committed to the defence of the frontier.

BARMAIDS PROHIBITED IN INDIA.

In pursuance of the recent order of Sir John Woodburn, lieutenant-governor of Bengal, prohibiting the employment of European barmaids in Calcutta, the board of revenue has ruled that the following condition shall be inserted in every license in Bengal.

London, Dec. 12.—In the Bow street police court, today, the prosecution against Dr. Krause, ex-governor of Johannesburg, on charges of high treason and inciting to murder, having concluded its case, counsel for the prisoner announced that he reserved his defence.

SWITZERLAND'S NEW PRESIDENT.

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PERSONALLY

COMMANDING

Lord Kitchener Has Taken the Field.

The Boers Are Shooting Blacks in Cold Blood.

Government Has Decided to Break Up the Unhealthy Concentration Camps—Dewet's Whereabouts.

PERSONALLY COMMANDING.

London, Dec. 12.—"Now that Gen. Ian Hamilton is here," the Pretoria correspondent of the Daily Telegraph cables, "Lord Kitchener has personally taken the field, and is directing the movements of the troops."

BOERS MURDERING THE BLACKS.

In speaking at Glasgow, Mr. Brodrick, the secretary of state for war, referred to Lord Kitchener's report upon the shooting of blacks by the Boers. Mr. Brodrick said that this report made it perfectly clear that these murders were not committed in moments of passion, but were part of an organized system to cover the tracks of the enemy and to prevent possible information of their whereabouts.

NO HALF-MEASURES.

Dealing with present aspects of the war, Mr. Brodrick said Boers had accepted parole and broken it, and that there would be no repetition of such actions. Within recent weeks Boer commanders had shown less regard for the laws of war, and these bandits would reach a crisis when they could no longer be treated as belligerents.

HE SAID THAT THE GOVERNMENT WAS FOR NO HALF-MEASURES.

He said that the government was for no half-measures in securing a settlement and that any fresh negotiations must emanate from the Boers. Lord Kitchener's statement specifically mentioned the Boers' refusal to accept parole and broken it, and that there would be no repetition of such actions.

SHOT IN COLD BLOOD.

In order to hide traces of the movements of Boer commandos, the Boers, which have already been announced, viz., to break up the unhealthy concentration camps and remove the overflow of concentrated Boer women and children to Holland.

DISPOSAL OF BOER WOMEN.

A correspondent of the Standard, telegraphing from Brussels, says that he has heard that confidential negotiations are in progress between Great Britain and Holland, which are not unlikely to result in an arrangement for sending Boer women and children to Holland.

DEWET'S MOVEMENTS.

The Times' correspondent in Pretoria says that the concerted force under Dewet remains in Lindley district. His attention seems to have been captured by the line of blockhouses now being built by Kromstadt to Lindley. Steyn probably accompanies Dewet.

"Q" BATTERY.

Cape Town, Dec. 11.—"Q" Battery, Royal Horse Artillery, embarked for England yesterday on the transport (name) and will arrive in England tomorrow. The battery was wounded at some time or another since its arrival in South Africa.

TO STAND TRIAL.

Commandant Scheepers, who was captured some time ago while ill, has recovered. He will be placed on trial at Graf Helmet tomorrow.

MORE TROOPS FOR AFRICA.

London, Dec. 12.—The British Government has decided to call out all reservists who have not completed their twelve years of service for service in South Africa.

ESSEX AND KENT RAILWAY.

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 12.—Notice has been given of an application to the legislature for an act relating to the Essex and Kent Railway Company by empowering the company to commence its railway within one year from the passing of such amendment.

FEDERATION OF CATHOLIC SOCIETIES.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Dec. 12.—The American Federation of Catholic Societies is now permanently established. At the sessions of the first day of its initial convention no opposition to the confederation was manifested.
