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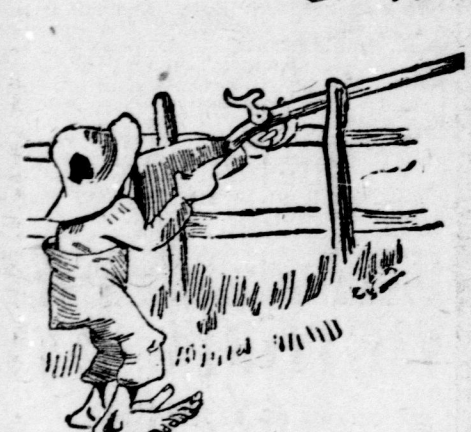

TRUST APPOINTS DR. W. F. BABB

Was Unanimously Named Chief Resident Surgeon at Victoria Hospital.

Dr. W. F. Babb, who has been for the past year a house surgeon at St. Joseph's Hospital, was unanimously chosen resident chief of Victoria Hospital at the meeting of the trust yesterday afternoon. There were three applications for this position and six for the position of house surgeon. Of the latter, two were to be appointed, and after considerable discussion and a vote on the matter, Dr. Allison Turner and Alex. Wright were appointed. The former's duties to commence July 1, and the latter's as soon as Dr. Eric Chapman's term is up.

Every member of the trust was present, and some important business was attended to. In the first place, the matter of the programme for the nurses' graduation was left in the hands of the hospital board, and the chairman of the board, Dr. Babb, was asked to prepare a report on the subject.

The superintendent reported that during the month of April there had been admitted to the hospital: Male patients 57, females 63, children 23, total, 143; discharged, 143; females 66, children 20, total 144; births 5, deaths 10, number of patients now in the hospital 102, number of operations during the month 40.

A letter was read from Provincial Secretary Stratton, stating that it was the intention of the department to apply the appropriation passed at the last session in such a way as to enable hospitals to charge \$3.50 per week instead of \$3.00, as heretofore.

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
