VENEZUELAN TROOPS WERE BADLY BEATEN

Some 115 Killed and 210 Wounded in the Fight at Carupano.

Port of Spain, Island of Trinidad, Tuesday, May 6.—Venezuelan government troops, under Gen. Vicente Gomez, attacked Carupano, State of Bermudez, Venezuela, by land and by sea, with the gunboats Restrepo, Atrevida and Zuchado, but the port is still in the hands of the revolutionists. After a seven hours battle the government forces were defeated and obliged to abandon the field, leaving 115 men dead and 210 wounded. The city suffered terribly from the shelling of the government war vessels. The remainder of Gen. Gomez's troops escaped on board the gunboats and reached Cumana, on the Gulf of Cariaco, May 7. Gomez was seriously wounded. Carupano now presents a spectacle of desolation. The cable is cut.

PREMIERS IN PROCESSION

Will Parade Through London
on June 27,

Escorted by Troops of the Various Colonies.

Mr. Rhodes' Proposed Newspaper—
Mr. Morgan's Next Step Will Be
Watched—He May Try to Get
Some English Railways.

London, May 10.—The Chronicle states that the colonial premiers have been invited to take part in the royal procession through London on the day following the coronation. As on the occasion of Queen Victoria's jubilee, they will have a prominent position in the procession, and will, it is expected, have a special escort of colonial troops. The arrangements for this procession are now almost complete and there can be little doubt that it will be one of the most striking sights we have ever seen in London.

As many of the colonial premiers are distinguished lawyers, and many of them King's Counsel, the benches of the Inner Temple are making the most important of their coronation festivities a banquet to the premiers of the colonies and other distinguished visitors. Tuesday, July 1, is the night fixed for it in their hall. Prince Christian, the Lord Chancellor, the speaker of the House of Commons, and several judges as benchers of the Inner Temple, will be among those acting as hosts on the occasion, but barristers and students are to be invited to join in the banquet on the same terms as the benchers.

MR. RHODES' PROPOSED NEWS-PAPER.

Mr. Stead states that up to the year 1899 he was sole executor to the will of the late Mr. Cecil Rhodes. It had been the intention of himself and Mr. Rhodes to found an international newspaper, with offices in London and New York, which should be largely conducted on educational lines. Mr. Rhodes had resolved to devote his fortune to the scheme, while another party was a step towards the realization of his dream of Anglo-American reunion. Mr. Stead's name was removed from the list of executors when he succeeded to the opposition to the Boer war and the scheme was then abandoned.

ENGLISH RAILWAYS NEXT.

Mr. Morgan's next step will be carefully watched. It is rumored that he is contemplating the acquisition of one or more English railways, and people are wondering how such a possibility should be met. Harland & Wolff are referred to as the servants of Morgan by one paper, while another says the famous Belfast shipbuilding firm will have no alternative but to cross the Atlantic and set up an establishment there.

RIVALS JOHN RUSKIN

Manager of Opera House Gives His Spouse to the Actor She Loves.

Scranton, May 12.—Manager Rudolph Phillips, of the Germania Theater, New York, proved himself the personification of generosity the other morning in police court when he surrendered his handsome wife to Actor Franz Erlau. Mrs. Phillips, who is a large and stylishly dressed woman, had been previously night accompanied by Erlau. A detective accompanying Phillips went to the hotel next morning and arrested the actress, who was then taken to the police station, where an arraignment took place Mrs. Phillips.

TEN MONTHS' BIG REVENUE

Increase Is Over Twelve and a Half Millions.

Surplus \$3,383,115—Public Debt Reduced by Two Millions—Figures That Talk.

Ottawa, May 9.—The financial statement for the ten months ending April 30 affords cause for much jubilation. The ordinary receipts exceeded the ordinary expenditure by the handsome sum of \$12,683,703, and yielded a surplus of \$3,383,115 over the ordinary and capital expenditure combined. Furthermore, there was a reduction in the public debt of \$2,047,653. This is a splendid showing, and indicates that the country's feet are firmly set on the highway of prosperity. The total revenue on consolidated fund account for the ten months amounted to \$46,600,728, whereas the expenditure under the same head was \$33,917,025. The revenue for this period shows an increase of \$4,611,425 compared with the previous ten months. The expenditure during the same time increased by \$2,304,559. Every branch of revenue shows a gain, the several increases being: Customs, \$2,754,534; excise, \$700,713; postoffice department, \$338,145; public works, including railways, \$806,824; miscellaneous, \$11,172. The details of the revenue statement compared with 1901 are as follows:

The statement of capital expenditure shows that \$6,243,131 was expended on railways and canals, \$1,980,739 on railway subsidies, \$509,709 on iron and steel bounties, and \$209,221 on the South African contingents.

ACTRESS FOUND LOST COUSIN

Mrs. Patrick Campbell's Surprise in Detroit.

M. H. Von Jasmund Is a Michigan Central Railway Conductor.

Detroit, May 11.—The Free Press says: Years ago—no matter how many—there lived in London, England, a brother and sister, John and Emily Tanner, children of well-to-do parents, and devotedly attached to each other. The children grew to manhood and womanhood, each married, and the brother and sister drifted apart, the former remaining in London, where he engaged in banking, while his sister went back to India, the early home of the family, later coming to America, where they died.

To John Tanner was born a daughter who early displayed unusual intelligence, coupled with a grace of person and attractiveness of feature which bespoke for her a brilliant career. The years passed by, and while children came to brighten the home of the sister in India, who had married a man named Von Jasmund, the English girl grew and developed, finally adopting the stage as a profession. Success crowned her efforts, and the name of Mrs. Patrick Campbell became a household word.

Among the children born to Mrs. Von Jasmund was a son, Mortimer H. Jasmund, who settled in Detroit some fifteen years ago, being a conductor on the Michigan Central Road. He had faint recollections of having heard of an uncle across the sea, likewise of a cousin, a distinguished actress, whose maiden name had been the same as his, and who afterwards married Patrick Campbell. So it happened that Mrs. Campbell, on her return to Detroit a week's engagement at the Detroit Opera House, Mr. Von Jasmund determined to ascertain whether she was the cousin whom he had often heard, though never seen.

He called at the Russell House Friday, secured an interview with Mrs. Campbell, and, to the delight of both himself and the distinguished actress, had no trouble in establishing the relationship. Mr. Von Jasmund and wife later enjoyed a drive about the city with Mrs. Campbell, and in the evening Mrs. Von Jasmund and a party of friends occupied a box at the Detroit Opera House and witnessed the production of "The Second Mrs. Tanqueray," as guests of Mrs. Campbell. Mr. Von Jasmund being out of the city, the party included, besides Mrs. Von Jasmund, Mrs. S. A. Von Jasmund, of St. Clair; Mrs. Solis, Mrs. C. H. Buell and Mrs. Elizabeth Rooney.

Besides her Detroit relative, who lives at 26 Peterboro street, Mrs. Campbell has three other cousins in this country, all of the same family—Seymour and Wase Von Jasmund, of St. Clair, Mich., and Mrs. Walter Courtenay, of Brainerd, Minn., wife of the chief surgeon of the Northern Pacific Road.

SHOP EARLY. WOODS' FAIR.

STRATFORD TRAVELER DEAD IN A DITCH

Two Masons Crushed to Death While at Work—Fatal Landslide.

Stratford, May 12.—John H. Storey, aged 40, traveling representative of the Kuntz Brewery, Waterloo, with headquarters at Stratford, was found dead Saturday morning underneath his wagon, in a ditch on the Downie road, about a mile and a quarter from the city. The horses were standing with the wagon, and Storey leaves a wife and three children.

DROWNED.

Toronto, May 12.—The body found floating in the lake on Friday has been identified as that of John R. Bell, a Massey-Harris employee, who disappeared about six weeks ago. He was 25 years old.

TWO WORKMEN KILLED.

Rochester, N. Y., May 12.—Philip Ziegler, aged 40, and Roger Dougherty, aged about 25, both stone masons, were almost instantly killed while at work at the Citizens' Light and Power plant, on Mill street. They were assisting in putting some heavy pipes in place, when the hoisting tackle slipped, and the pipes swinging round struck Ziegler and Dougherty, terrific blows, crushing their skulls. Both expired a few minutes later.

FATAL LANDSLIDE.

Vancouver, B. C., May 12.—A serious slide occurred at Powers' hickling at Kelso, B. C. One man was killed and several injured.
