ent, but they will see that no effort is made to destroy our line by tearing up our tracks.

Several constables will also remain on the scene, this morning the work of removing the cars will be commenced.

G. F. Macdonnell, of the legal department of the new railway, who, with H. E. Moore, of the same department, and John Ramsden, high constable of the County of York, watched the proceedings, explained the position of the James' Bay Company. He said that concern had the full right to make the crossing, the Grand Trunk had an order from the railway commission approving of the spur line. That was rescinded last week so far as it affected the James' Bay right of way.

When asked if his company contemplated leasing up the Grand Trunk plant without consulting us, he replied that he had the right to do so, because the Grand Trunk was in the position of having no line there with the sanction of the Government.

The railway commission has no power to give them the right to cross our line without consulting us, he remarked Superintendent Browne, when discussing the affair. "It can allow them to obtain land by expropriation or arbitration."

It is stated by another authority that the Grand Trunk takes the position that its line was there before the plans of the James' Bay road were approved. An order was granted last week rescinding the former award of the railway commission to the Grand Trunk, they assert, only so far as it affects the right of way of the James' Bay Railway over the property of Robert Davies. The land in dispute, they add, is not under the control of the latter gentleman, but held by the Grand Trunk under a lease.

OLD WORLD NEWS BY THE WIRELESS

Associated Press May Adopt It for the Collection of Its News.

New York, Feb. 7. - Tests made by the Associated Press may determine whether a trans-Atlantic wireless telegraph system is a possibility for the transmission and reception of news.

Before the system was placed in the hands of the Associated Press for its condemnation or its approval it had undergone exhaustive tests by its promoters. So well satisfied were they with the results achieved that the entire plant was turned over to the operators of the news association, who were to subject it to a rigid investigation.

It was agreed that the company owning the system should be allowed to extend another from the New York test. For fifteen days these trials continued, the station being established on the Scottish coast and in Massachusetts, near Plymouth. In ten of these days unusually good results were attained, the other five days were not so successful, on account of atmospheric and other causes, of unavoidable mechanical difficulties.

So satisfactory, however, were the general results that the system was turned over to the Associated Press. Under the direction of Mr. Stone, a special operator was sent from the London office to the station in Scotland, and another from the New York headquarters to the Massachusetts test. Each man was given a secret message to transmit, the receiver being ignorant of what he was expected to take. Thus far the messages have not been received in their entirety, but in each instance there were obstacles which, under normal circumstances, would not be present.

BALFOUR LEADER IS LATEST GUESS

Chamberlain Is Likely to Withdraw With Band of Tariff Reformers.

London, Feb. 7. - Surface indications tend to strengthen the belief that former Premier Balfour, if he is elected to Parliament for the city of London, will remain the leader for the Conservatives in the House of Commons, and that Joseph Chamberlain will become the leader of the tariff reformers, with a separate organization.

The Times, the Daily Telegraph and other former newspaper friends of both Balfour and Chamberlain have gone over completely to Balfour, and the opinion at the political clubs is that the breach will widen as the days pass, and that only a miracle now can prevent the ending of the usefulness of the Unionists as one party machine.

While it is protested that the friendship between Balfour and Chamberlain is as strong as ever, this may be taken to refer solely to personal relations.

Those who are best informed say that unless the unexpected happens the two statesmen will in the future become political enemies.

Some Conservative newspapers say that recent developments have shown all the evidences of deep-seated intrigues against Mr. Balfour, firstly in the chorus of demand for Walter Hume Long as leader, and now in the open threat to place a tariff reformer in the field against Mr. Balfour.

While the Liberal party still is undecided as to whether it shall run a candidate, one announcement already has been made by a Liberal, D. M. Mason, a prominent London financier, who unsuccessfully contested Preston, Glasgow, at the recent election. T. G. Bowles makes the positive announcement that he will oppose Mr. Balfour unless the latter declares definitely for free trade, and from Birmingham comes a strong intimation that a tariff reformer will enter the lists.

Meanwhile, Mr. Balfour, undismayed, stands to his guns and says he will not withdraw, and up to the present time he has not been speaking in any of the Unionist members, though some of the newspapers this morning say such a meeting will be called.

It is, however, an open secret that Mr. Balfour has stated that he has no hopes that a permanent coalition would lead to conciliation or harmony.

ST. KITTS TEAM QUITS. St. Catharines, Feb. 6. - As a protest against the action of the members of the Niagara Falls team in playing a match with the professional Pittsburgh hockey team at the Falls last night, the Queen's hockey team of this city, today announced their intention of withdrawing from the Niagara District Hockey League, speaking in the name of the Queen's team are strictly amateur, and they want to remain so. Last year their lacrosse team won the junior championship in this district, and their hockey team has held the city junior championship for several years. John M. Cameron, president of the Niagara District Hockey League, speaking in the name of the Queen's withdrawing, said that the action of the Falls teams and the withdrawal of the Queen's will probably mean the breaking up of the league. He said: "You can't blame the Queen's. They want to play the C. L. Junior League and O. H. A. hockey next season."
