CHELSEA AND Y. M. C. A. WIN IN SOCCER ON THE HEIGHTS

Former Defeat Saints Three to One and Keep Out of Last Place.
While Carshops Were Whitewashed By Five
Goals To Nothing.

Chelsea 3, All Saints 1. Such was the result of the soccer game on the Heights between the teams mentioned on Saturday.

Great interest had been centered in the outcome of the above match, both by the players themselves and their supporters, inasmuch as upon the result depended which was to take bottom place in the league schedule, a position neither team would accept without a severe struggle. A good crowd of spectators turned out to witness the match in spite of the threatening appearance of the weather.

Chelsea won the toss for choice of position, and elected to play with the Y and against them, which decision, after events proved, materially assisted them in their victory. The Saints, aided by the wind, did the majority of the attacking in the first half and corner after corner was forced by them, none of which, however, were turned to account, mainly owing to the excellent work of Chelsea's defense. One goal only was scored by the Saints during the first half and that by their clever inside, who, taking full advantage of a slip on the part of the Chelsea's back, darted down the field with the ball at a speed which made all pursuit hopeless, and safely deposited it in the net far out of the goalkeeper's reach.

The Second Half.

Both teams took every advantage that the five minutes' intermission afforded them in the way of resting and preparing for what proved to be the more strenuous part of the game. From the restart the Chelsea made a bee-line for their opponents' goal, but returned empty handed. Both teams, about half-way through the second half, began to show signs of fatigue in consequence of the exceptionally hard game, which was being put up by both sides, and it looked as though the Chelsea were to win the match, when the Chelsea's spirits as cocaine is said to do on a field, and from the kickoff till the end of the game the Chelsea succeeded in finding the net twice. Thus the game ended in Chelsea's favor by 3 to 1.

Carshops Whitewashed.
In the second game on the Heights the fast Y. M. C. A. team handed the Carshops team a nice coat of the white stuff, which was a score of 5 to 0. The losers were game, and fought for every point, but Dame Fortune was not with them, and they took the count.

The Y. M. C. A. team is one of the fastest that has been seen in a local City League in a long time, and despite the fact that the team had to be practically reorganized at the beginning of the present season, owing to inroads on last year's list of players by some of the other teams.

Famous Claude Pearce Is Entered For Olympic Long Distance Runs

The entry of Claude Pearce, the famous Toronto distance runner, for the five and ten-mile races at the Queen's Park athletic meet, May 16, was received today by Mr. Stanley Brent, of the London Y. M. C. A. Pearce is famous the continent over for his remarkable run from Hamilton to Toronto a few months ago, when

he broke all existing records and set a mark which will doubtless stand for years.

It will be remembered that Longboat tried to make the run, but broke down after six miles out of Toronto. Another distance runner who will compete in the ten-mile event is Frank Nicholas, Dr. H. A. Stevenson's clever Indian performer. Nicholas is one of the best road men this part of the country has produced, and he will doubtless be well up when the tape is reached.

A large number of Toronto entries are expected shortly.

SCHOOLBOY DOES 100 YARDS IN 9.4.5

Cambridge, Mass., May 3.—Two records were broken and one equaled in the annual interscholastic track and field games under the auspices of the Harvard Athletic Association today. The meet was won by Worcester, with 28 points; Phillips-Andover was second, with 27 points, and the Kilmarnock school of Boston, third, with 15 points.

The feature was the work of E. E. Nelson of the Volkman school, who ran the 100 yards in 9.4.5.

In the 220 yard dash Nelson equaled the interscholastic record of W. A. Chick of Andover—21.3.5. W. R. Gardner of Andover broke the association's record in the pole vault by setting a height of 11 feet 3 inches.

LONDON HORSES SCORE HEAVILY

The Beck String Make a Fine
Showing at the Toronto
Horse Show.

Toronto, May 2.—The London Hunt Club scored heavily at the Toronto Horse Show tonight, taking down a handsome cup and numerous other prizes.

In the team championship the competition was very keen, and was won by the London team, made up as follows:

Kennebec, ridden by Hon. Adam Beck; My Fellow, ridden by Mr. James McNece; Kakabeka, ridden by Mr. Wood Leonard. The prize for this event was a handsome silver cup.

Hon. Adam Beck took down first and third prize in the Governor-General's competition for the best cavalry horse with Sorota and Seneca, while Mrs. Beck's My Fellow, finished first in the ladies' hunters. Third place also went to Mrs. Beck with Kakabeka. The Toronto Hunt Club cup was won by Mr. Beck with Kennebec, and the hunter championship with the same horse. The reserve ribbon was taken by Mr. Beck with Keewatin.

Col. A. M. Smith's handsome mare, Chateau Belle, took second prize in the middleweight qualified hunters' class.

The London horses will compete at the Montreal Horse Show next week.
