The country fared worse than the city. The pastures were dried up, and the creeks were extremely low. The cattle were suffering in many places for lack of water.

For some days, however, the winds have been from a southerly direction, and it was thought that rain would soon come. Last evening it felt like rain, and the people began to take heart. Sunday was a hot day, but in the evening it cooled off. Towards morning, the clouds gathered, and a hard, soaking rain resulted.

It was the best kind of rain, warm and refreshing, and it was not accompanied by that violent change of temperature that

There will be more rain yet. It is cloudy, and there will no doubt be a continued downpour for some days.

The average rainfall for September is about 2.66 inches. This September there has been practically no rainfall up till this morning so the rain king will have to work most industriously

There is no smoke, no dust, no unbearable heat this morning. Everything is fresh and clean.
