

S. Dennis, a member of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, and assistant to the second vice-president of the C. P. R. Mr. Dennis pointed out the superiority of the Canadian law reating to irrigation, under which litigation was practically unknown. The purchaser of irrigated land gets his title for the water direct from the crown, the same as the title for the land. The amount of water to be suprlied for a given area is also fixed by law, which prevents the overcrowding of streams. The Government keeps a debit and credit account for each stream, the credit being the
