Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 10.—Things are very lively at the Legislative Buildings, in preparation for the opening of the session this afternoon. The address in reply to the speech from the throne will be moved by Charles Stewart, of Sedgewick, and will be seconded by either M. J. McCarthy or H. J. McGrath, but neither of these wishes to give up his federal position. E. Bennett has announced that he is not considered sufficiently strong in the faith for the position.

CASES ARE ENTERED FOR THE HIGH COURT

Interesting Actions Will Be Tried in London on Monday Next.

Two cases which were entered for trial about six months ago, but which were later postponed, have been re-entered for the November high court sittings, which commence at the court house before Justice Mulock of Toronto on Monday next.

One is an action of O. C. Holmes, of the township of Adelaide, against Richard Pincombe, and his wife, Amelia Ann Pincombe, while the other is a suit instituted by George Howe, of Caradoc, against James Cushman.

In the first case Holmes claims that prior to 1894 he supplied a quantity of wheat to Pincombe, who was then a miller in Stratroy. He says that no payment was ever made, and that on May 25, 1894, an agreement was arrived at, the amount of Pincombe's indebtedness being fixed at \$150. Two promissory notes of \$75 each, payable in one and two years, were given by Pincombe, but it is claimed that he never made an effort to meet his alleged obligation.

The plaintiff claims to have received a judgment for \$100.50 and \$450 costs, in the sixth division court on Nov. 17, 1898, but the defendant was then insolvent. At the commencement of this action \$252.30 was said to be due.

However, after this judgment was given Pincombe purchased property on the Egrement road in Adelaide, and also in the town of Stratroy, the conveyances being made out to his wife. A house was later erected there, but the plaintiff alleges that the property was made over to Mrs. Pincombe solely for the purpose of avoiding payment. Ross & Bixel, of Stratroy, are acting for the defendant, and Elliot Traver, also of Stratroy, for the plaintiff.

The statement of claims in the other action alleges that George Howe, of Caradoc, leased 50 acres of land to James Cushman, the agreement being that the tenant was to pay \$100 a year, commencing Oct. 21, 1906. Howe states that no rent was paid for 1908 or 1909, and that at the request of Cushman he paid the taxes, amounting to \$18, which, according to the agreement, should have been paid by Cushman.

The defendant replies that Howe bought the property for him, and that later he tried to claim the ownership of the land for himself. On May 1, 1909, the matter was brought before a county court judge, when Howe agreed to convey the property to Cushman for \$250, the defendant in this action to assume a mortgage. Cushman claims that he has tendered the money, and has carried out his part of the agreement, while Howe, it is claimed, has violated it. Elliot Traver, of Stratroy, for the plaintiff; Ross & Bixel, of Stratroy, for the defendants.

It was thought that the meeting would have been held on Nov. 9, but for some reason this was impossible. A week has elapsed, and still there have been no notices of a meeting sent out.

It is rumored that there will be no further negotiations. The Toronto Electric offered to sell out to that city, but negotiations got no farther than the preliminary stage. The company realizes that nothing could be done by further efforts to dispose of their holdings.

It is said that the Toronto end of the London Electric has come to the conclusion that negotiations with the city of London would be useless, and it is now stated that nothing further will be done.

NEW ROUTE TO EDSON

Latest Road Cuts Distance From Medicine Lodge Considerably.

Edson, Alta., Nov. 8.—The Alberta Government, having decided to have the railway end of the wagon road to Grande Prairie, at Medicine Lodge, Edsonites immediately subscribed funds to open a road from Edson, to tap the Government road. A ridge was found running from Edson to the junction of the Athabaska and Baptists Rivers, where it intersects the Government road, and a crossing of the Athabaska River is effected.

The Edson trail is the shorter by 22 miles, and the entire distance to Grande Prairie will be about 130 miles as against 500 by the present round-about route. The trip will be ready in January for the trip to the head of fertile north. In making the survey of the road it was discovered that there is a large amount of excellent farming and grazing land tributary to Edson. By following the ridges, which trend from the northwest to the southeast there would be no difficulty in building a railway from Edson to Grande Prairie and thence to the upper waters of the Peace River.
