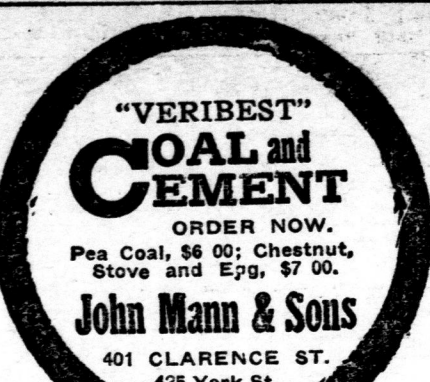

ENOUGH PULPWOOD FOR 200 YEARS

Vast Forests Untouched in the Region of Hudson Bay.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—"From what I saw of the pulpwood forests in the Hudson Bay region I have no doubt that the newspapers will keep on issuing for a century or two."

Mr. L. S. Amery, of London, Eng., a former distinguished member of the staff of the Times, and author of "The Times History of the South African War," has just returned from a tour of the northern wilds in company with Earl Grey, and will speak before the Empire Club on Thursday on the resources of the northern country through which he passed.

Mr. Amery, as a consequence of his journey, does not share the popular alarm over the depletion of the pulp forests and the imminence of a famine in paper.

Largest in the World.

"We passed through probably the largest pulpwood area in the world, over 200 miles square, and penetrated by scores of rivers. Within ten years pulp mills will be thickly scattered on all these tributaries. Means of transportation will be plentiful, and the shipping route through Hudson Bay and the Grand Trunk Pacific." Mr. Amery remarked with a smile: "I feel quite confident therefore that we shall all grow our daily editions for a couple of hundred years more."

"One may estimate the quality of the climate," he continued, "when I say that on the way to Hudson Bay we were in swimming time three days, and in Hudson Bay enjoyed breakfast on deck, dressed in our pajamas."

"The gigantic possibilities of the land enticed us. Navigation in Hudson Bay is unimpeded by floating ice except during the first few weeks of summer when the shore-ice is driven outward, although it would not be sufficient to interfere with ocean-going vessels."

A Fine Journey.

"From Lake Winnipeg to the Bay our journey lay through a series of rivers broken frequently by waterfalls and rapids of such beauty as to almost surpass description. The Nelson River which we used in our trip is navigable for perhaps 70 miles, although vessels would have to be of exceptionally light draft with shallow hind wheel. The Hayes River, up which Governor Simpson of the Hudson Bay Company sailed so majestically 200 years ago, with his 38-foot canoe, his barges, his banners, and his dazzling display of authority, appears to offer some difficulties to steamship navigation. I question if its depth is sufficient in places to pass anything from these canoes. As for the benefits accruing from a close study of an almost unknown country, the journey was perhaps the pleasantest holiday I have ever experienced."

Mr. Amery, who is a candidate for the British Parliament at the last elections, is a well-known authority on military affairs. He is an advocate of compulsory training for national defence, and is a member of the House of Commons. He is pledged to the principle as against 40 in the last House. Mr. Amery is an optimist on the military situation of the Empire. He is a regular army," he said, "was never in such an efficient state as at present."

MOTOR-DRIVEN LINER BUILT FOR GERMANS

Oil Fuel To Be Utilized and Great Saving in Labor Will Be Effectuated.

London, Sept. 22.—In the face of all the rumors and counter rumors as to what the admiralty intends to do in the production of motor driven warships, information as to what the Hamburg-Voss firm actually is doing in the real construction of the \$600-ton motor-driven liner that is being built for it by the Hamburg firm of Blohm & Voss, has attracted wide attention. The vessel is of a tonnage which may be judged by the fact that it is to be slightly larger than that of a P. and O. vessel of the Egypt class.

According to statements issued, the German line was firmly convinced that the marine motor now has reached a point of development at which it can be increasingly used for large liners. Whether that is so, as this stage, extends to the utilization of the present motor possibilities to the propulsion of large liners or ships of war is not discussed by the company's experts. With oil engines, naturally the boilers become superfluous. The mechanical process of the transposition of the energy contained in the fuel into power is accomplished in the cylinders. A new device will render the exhaust almost silent and the fumes of the gases will be invisible and odorless. The two three-cylinder engines, which will give the ship a speed of twelve and a half knots, are the joint product of the Maschinenfabrik Augsburg-Nürnberg and of Blohm & Voss.

It is understood, too, that the German line has entered into a long term contract with the Standard Oil Company for the delivery of its fuel. The residue in the process of the refinement of the oil only will be used as oil fuel. The rate of heating with such oil, so tests have demonstrated, is one and a half times greater than that of coal. The loading of the liquid fuel, which will be done by pumps, is quicker and cheaper than coaling. Only twenty-seven persons will be needed for the oil engines, while in steamships of similar size about two hundred and fifty stokers and coal drawers would be employed. Moreover, the motor liner, by space conservation thus obtained, can carry thousand tons more cargo than her steam rival of similar dimensions.

HOW TRAVELLERS SPOIL TRAVEL

The Saturday Review Growls at the Charges They Bring.

The Saturday Review points out that the old-world-loving tourist can not have it both ways. If, when he goes to Italy, he clamors for better hotels, he will probably get them, but at a cost, to the higher attractions which have brought him to Italy.

"When, after a two or three years' absence, we revisit some old Umbrian city, we find that our previous strongly expressed comments on the 'lack of a decent hotel' or 'vile postal arrangements' have borne painful fruit in the shape of some brand-new 'Hotel Grande Bretagne,' in the place of the quaint, old-fashioned—and, after all, fairly comfortable—albergo, or that some magnificent old palazzo has been demolished to make room for a huge postoffice of modern Italian-German design—and what more may follow in the wake of improvement heaven alone knows."

"It is this blighting suddenness with which would-be progress moves nowadays that appals the few of us backward ones, lovers of the old. The energetic majority of new brooms are irrefragable, and in their zeal sweep passes but some lovely traces of older art disappear into the rubbish heap. The minority protests—but protests in vain—that suddenly to plunge a little of the Italian town from its peaceful enjoyment of oil-lit street lamps and ox-wagons into the full glare of electric lighting and tramcars is only to be compared with the transplanting of a savage from his primeval forests into Buckingham Palace, and there insisting on royalty dining with him. Neither result is productive of immediate happiness to the individuals concerned."

"To be of any lasting benefit to a country changes and the introduction of new ideas should be gradual, and the temperance society to oppose the abuse of reforming spirits is much to be desired. 'Change alone the changeless Lord of things, alone the same'—but let the changes be of gradual growth, the way prepared for them, the public educated to receive them. More harm can be wrought by unqualified abuse of things old than can be rectified by putting in place things new. The remedy we propose, and what is really wanted, is an international 'Where to draw the line' society, whose members would be responsible for all necessary repairs of the poor old Past, guaranteeing its survival for the student, while allowing for the provision of a certain amount of modern comfort for the average travelling Philistine."

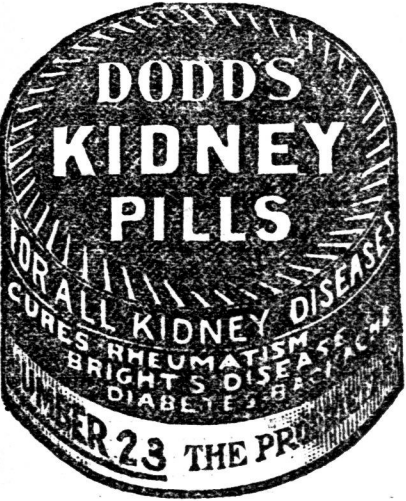
A CURIOUS CEREMONY.

Fire-Walkers in Tahiti Furnish a Remarkable Performance.

An interesting feature of the celebration of the French national holiday in Tahiti was a fire-walking performance given by several of the natives of Raiatea, an island a hundred and forty miles away. These people were darker than the olive-skinned Tahitians, and their general appearance suggested that they were not of pure Polynesian blood.
