GREAT DAY AT DUFFERIN PARK

The Best Racing That Has Been Seen For Some Time.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—The best racing that has been seen at Dufferin Park for many a long day is the general verdict of the large number of spectators who journeyed out to the course to witness the final day's programme of the Toronto Driving Club's winter meeting, and the attendance was fully as large as on Christmas Day. The day could not have been better for winter racing, and as the track was in first-class shape it was but fitting that the racing should also be good.

More close finishes than are usually seen on a harness horse track, crowded in the afternoon's racing, and for the close finishes occurred in the 2:40 pace, which, by the way, is still unsettled.

The regular programme consisted of the 2:20 pace and the 2:12 pace, besides the race that had been carried over from Saturday, when Little Fred had won two heats and Little Dick and Shaun Rhue, one each.

Nat Ryan was riding behind Shaun Rhue and won the two heats necessary to annex first money for the horse's owner, James O'Halloran, the popular ex-president of the Dufferin Driving Club.

As already stated, the 2:20 pace was desperately contested. Eight horses started for the opening heat, and seven of those were there in the hunt when darkness caused the race to go over until this morning at 10 o'clock, when the race was finished, free of admission to the spectators. The Under-taker, that won the 2:30 pace the opening day, was favorite at even money against the balance of the field before the first heat, and although Barrett did all in his power to get down in front each heat, two was all he could gather in. His sulky wheel collapsed after passing the half in the first heat, and he excused himself, but in the second heat, Barrett was the previous heat winner, and Doctor Wilkes beat him. However, Barrett got him down in the third and also in the fourth, but along came the outsider, Billy B., and won the race. The race was proved to be the final heat of the day. The first two heats were fast, the second, in fact, equalling the time made in the 2:12 pace, each heat of which was paced in 2:31. Nat Ryan's gelding, Dr. Wilkes, was the only horse in the race, as he was barely beaten in each of the first three heats, taking second each time, and now stands only for fourth money, as there are three heat winners.

The non-appearance of Knight Onwards and St. Anthony robbed the 2:12 pace of considerable interest, but still five classy pacers faced Starter McKee. Furiuso, Mattie Chimes, Lou Jean, Nellie G. and Nellie Edna made up the field, and Furiuso was installed as favorite. The unexpected happened in this race, as the rank outsider in the betting, Nettie Ethan, took the select society racers into camp by the straight heat route, favored by a good start in the opening heat, she went from fourth position to the rail at the first turn, shutting off Mattie Chimes, that had drawn the rail position, and she led throughout the balance of the race. Furiuso, the original favorite, made a close finish in the third heat, but fell short by half a length. Lou Jean and Nellie G. appeared to be short of work, and the old mare, Mattie Chimes, is plainly out of form.

The horses were finally all shipped by express to Ottawa tonight, where the big winter meeting opens at Lansdowne Park Thursday. The summary:
