Following a few weeks' illness, Mr. William Percival, aged 90 years, and a resident of London for the greater part of his life, died at his home, 36 Grosvenor street, on Tuesday evening. Mr. Percival was one of the pioneer businessmen of this city. Sixty-five years ago he started a flour and feed business on Richmond street. He later occupied a store where the Ontario Furniture Company is now located on Dundas street. He retired from business nearly 35 years ago.

Mr. Percival never married. Miss Margaret Percival, a sister, resided at 36 Grosvenor street, and a brother, Mr. Henry Percival, lives in London Township. Messrs. Walter Percival, Morris Percival, William Percival and Percy Lewis are nephews of the deceased.

Mrs. W. H. Worman, and Mrs. Wm. Footitt, of this city, and Mrs. Stoneman, of Ingersoll, are nieces.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, and burial will take place in Woodland Cemetery. Rev. Canon Sage will officiate.

NO ASSYRIANS SERVE IN TURKISH ARMY

Compatriots Here Think Turks Are Afraid to Trust Them.

There are no Assyrians in the ranks of the Turkish army, according to C. Franks, an Assyrian merchant, of this city. A large number of them were mobilized, and preparations were being made to send them to the front, when orders were received that they were to disband, and they returned to their homes.

No reason was given for this sudden change in plans, but theories are not lacking among the local Assyrians, who are watching with great interest the events of the war, as chronicled in the Arabic newspapers, which reach here from time to time.

Some think that it was on account of the Turkish Government being unable to supply transport, while others believe that they are so short of funds as to be unable to arm and equip further troops.

Mr. Franks thinks that the real reason is that the Assyrians are afraid to trust the Turkish subjects. The Assyrians have suffered much under Turkish rule, he explained, and bear no love to them. Should Assyrian troops be sent to the front, they would probably either desert to fight, or promptly desert to the enemy.

The Turks are well aware of these facts, and that is their chief reason, in the opinion of Mr. Franks, for not raising troops among their subjects in Asiatic Turkey.

LEAVING NAPIER

Rev. J. Ure Stewart Has Accepted a Call to Whitechurch.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Petrolia, March 5.—At a meeting of the Presbytery of Sarnia, held here yesterday, Rev. J. Ure Stewart, B. A., pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Napier and Chalmers Presbyterian Church, Brookville, was dismissed to the Presbytery of Maitland, a very hearty and unanimous call from the congregations of Whitechurch and Langside having been accepted by him. The call was accompanied with a guarantee of \$1,000 salary, manse and a month's vacation.

BOARD OF EDUCATION OBJECTS TO DANCING

Trustee Hunt Emphatic—Collegiate Crest Not To Be Used.

PUPILS PLAN A BALL

"Disgrace to Countenance It," Says One—Trustee Gammage More Lenient.

"The board of education is not in the dance business," emphatically declared Trustee A. M. Hunt at the board meeting Tuesday afternoon. Trustee F. H. Greenlees presented the request of some of the Collegiate Institute pupils for permission to use the Collegiate crest of arms on the program of a ball to be given by them in the Dayton & McCormick hall. They further wished to advertise it as the Collegiate Institute ball. Trustee Greenlees favored their request, and Trustee W. W. Gammage observed that dancing is not objected to in American schools.

"The board of education should not favor dancing in public institutions," said Dr. Teasdale.

"I am strongly opposed to the board countenancing anything of the kind," said Trustee Hunt.

"It would be a disgrace for the board to countenance it, or to sanction the use of the name of the Collegiate."

On Mr. Hunt's motion, the board decided to have nothing to do with the affair, and not to permit the use of the crest or the name of the institute.

PRESBYTERY FAVORS UNION OF CHURCHES

Where Presbyterian and Methodist Bodies Are Weak Plan Advocated.

The presbytery on Tuesday morning took up the motion of Mr. Alexander in regard to the union of Presbyterian and Methodist congregations where both churches are weak. Dr. McDonald spoke in favor of the motion, and pointed out that in small country places two churches were across the street from each other, and were building new churches. It was not likely that this condition of things would continue as a speedy union. Mr. Alexander referred to the extraordinary action of some Anglicans in objecting to Dr. Symonds preaching in a Presbyterian church. Dr. McCrae pointed out the method of co-operation adopted between the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Congregational churches in the west. After a long discussion the motion of Mr. Alexander was adopted.

Dr. Munro presented a report advising that Ivan congregation had alone, between the Presbyterian and St. Andrew's Mount Bridges be formed into one charge. Dr. Munro is moderator of Ivan. The presbytery, on motion of Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. MacGillivray, expressed its great appreciation of the splendid liberality of all the congregations in the presbytery which have increased their ministers' stipends. Nearly all the country churches that were below the new minimum have come up to the \$1,000 mark. In some cases also congregations that were not giving holidays have added a month's vacation to their minister. Rev. T. H. Mitchell, Thos. Alexander and Mr. Stuart were heartily congratulated on their fine work in augmentation within the bounds of the presbytery.

There was a lively discussion on the question of the ballot for the election of clerk at the last meeting. There had been some misunderstanding, but the presbytery passed a unanimous motion confirming Mr. Martin's appointment.

The first business in the afternoon was the appointment of commissioners to the General Assembly. The following were appointed by rotation from the roll of the presbytery: Rev. Messrs. George Weir, Glenoe; J. M. MacGillivray, Aylmer; D. C. Stephens, Melbourne; John Hosie, London; W. S. Galbraith, Thamesford; R. B. Macdonald, Ingersoll; and W. S. Craig and Carlisle, Wardsville and Newbury, Glenoe, Melbourne and Riverside, New St. James, London, and Argyle and West Lorne.

A special meeting of the presbytery will be held in St. Thomas on Tuesday, March 18, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. It is understood that a call from Ripley will be presented to Rev. Geo. Gilmore, of Fingal. Prof. Paterson, of the Western University, and Mr. McIntosh, called attention to the need of all the churches sending recruits for the work of the ministry. Good work is being done in this regard.

Rev. T. H. Mitchell was appointed moderator of Mount Bridges and North Carleton.

The peace manifesto issued by the presbytery of New Westminster was considered by the presbytery. Rev. Principal MacKay introduced the matter, and it has been discussed all over the church. Mr. Currie moved the adoption of the report and Mr. Stuart seconded.

Rev. Mr. McIntosh thought more time should be taken for consideration. The matter was laid over till next meeting.

The report of the committee to appoint standing committees was presented and adopted.
